



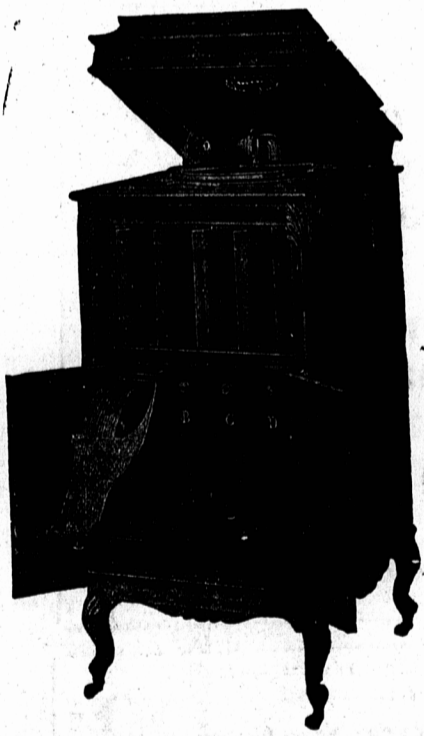

Premier Meighen Has Message for Thinkers

(Continued from Page One.)

They want the old Cartwright policy; one that the government of 1896 found they could not put into effect without ruining this country. They want the old discarded free-trade-as-in-England policy and all that in the name of 'progress.'

Free Traders Wreck Country

"Does anyone doubt they mean free trade. Here is what the leader Mr. Crerar says: 'Canadian industrial establishments that have to be propped up by a tariff are of no value to the country.'

"How would you like that in Truro. That means free trade if words mean anything. If this country wants that, they won't want it long. It means buying goods from other nations on credit instead of making them ourselves. It means debasing the Canadian dollar worse even than it is today. It means industries in other places and in other countries instead of here. It means workmen's homes put up for sale. It means more taxes for owners, a bigger debt for all, and a smaller Canada to pay."

"Keep in mind, as well, if by any aggregation of groups, the present government is defeated, the free trade group will be in supreme control. I do not think there is anyone who seriously doubts that. No one who observes carefully and measures the winds and tides. I am confident and more confident every day that the sound sense of Canadians will rally around the government and that it will not fail, but does anyone in front of me think that the strongest group among our toes, and the strongest by far is not the free trader, the tariff destroyer, pointed unfortunately and unnaturally to the free-wrecker who wants everything else destroyed as well. I don't speak the words of presumption. I can only do my art, but there is the combination that the rest of the country is pitted against. I don't believe one-third of the farmers of Canada are free traders, if they will only stop and think, and see what they are heading for. I don't believe one-tenth of labor is free trade. About two years of free trade would cut three that are. I am aware there are some I say who believe in a tariff for the purposes of revenue, and who believe in a customs tariff as well for the sake of keeping work in Canada and holding and extending our industrial life. There are some I say who believe in a tariff for both purposes, and who still claim to be opposed to the government's fiscal policy. Mr. Macfie, Mr. King, as shown by his Toronto speech of a week ago, is one. Here is what Mr. King said:

"There will still be required for purposes of revenue, large sums of money, which, of necessity, will have to be raised by indirect taxation through customs tariff. In revising the tariff to this end, care will be taken of the position and needs of all the industries in our country."

"There is only one meaning to that: continue a tariff for purpose of substantial revenue and so levy the rates as to fairly protect the industries of Canada. That was the meaning given to it in actual practice when both these men were members of the government of Canada. That is the meaning given to it by Mr. Fielding over and over again in almost those very words when he was Minister of Finance. That is the meaning Mr. Fielding frankly says he intends today. That is what Mr. Beland frankly says he intends today. That, ladies and gentlemen, is the government's policy, and the government does not intend to do a farthing of customs taxation beyond what will meet those ends."

"To meet the need of revenue when \$350,000,000 is required, we now before revision, have a tariff of about 23 per cent. on dutiable goods."

"To meet the need of revenue when \$125,000,000 or less, was required, they had an average tariff over fifteen years ago of 28.3 per cent. on dutiable goods. Besides that, we have added to the free list. To meet the need of making goods at home, instead of buying from the United States, we have before revision a tariff of approximately 15 per cent. on all goods imported, both free and dutiable, and that when the Canadian dollar is at a discount of 13 cents on the dollar."

"When wheat was 75 cents a bushel, they maintained a tariff on farm implements that averaged 20.2 per cent. When wheat is over \$2 a bushel, we have a tariff on farm implements that averages 14.6 per cent. Even under reciprocity it would have been 17.3 per cent. Speaking at Stirling, two weeks ago, I said that opposition to the government's tariff policy on the grounds I have described, and from those men, was fiscal humbug. I am grateful to Mr. King for coming so promptly to my assistance and demonstrating the correctness of what I said."

Progress is Motto

"Like its predecessor, the Union Government, the Government which I have the honor to lead, will have for its motto 'Progress, intelligent, orderly progress, and by aim will be to keep before the Canadian people the thought that this is the land, above all lands of abundant and abounding opportunity. I shall strive to instill into the minds of our young people especially that nowhere on the globe will they find better chances to succeed by the application of honest industry. A truly great future is ahead of Canada, if we only keep our heads and seriously believe in the doctrine of work. Work, after all, is the normal condition of man, I mean of every man and it is the best answer and antidote to Socialistic, Bolshevik and Soviet nonsense."

"The great task before the people of Canada is to get back not to
