### DEVICES TO EVADE THE LAW.

Since the amendment to the Prohibition Act giving the right to search for liquors became workable by allowing the officers to secure a warrant on suspicion of liquors being kept for sale many and various devices have been resorted to by the violators in order to escape conviction. At first the stock of bottles was thrown from a window or hurriedly removed to a place of concealment on the approach of the search officers, and a heavy hammer kept near the beer cask to spill the contents. But enough was generally secured to convict the offenders.

Then the "shute" was contrived, leading down from the bar to the cellar, with a trap door half way down, and a pile of rocks at the bottom. The spirit would rise, like Banquo's ghost, when customers were in, but on the appearance of the officers the trap would be sprung and the bottles would "shoot the shute" and be shattered on the rocks below. Still a bottle or part of one with spirituous contents, would occasionally escape the shock and lead to conviction. More than once the officers in passing one of these resorts and not intending to enter, have heard the crash of breaking bottles. The stock was sacrificed on a false alarm.

Another device was a cabinet on rollers, which moved back into an adjoining room, leaving a plain and honest looking wall as the only thing visible in that direction. And still another device was an old well in the backyard, serving alike for a storehouse or a receptacle for the hastily poured-out drinkables. Such are a few of the devices for evading the law. But thanks to a good law and vigilant officers we have today by far the soberest and most orderly town in Canada. Thanks are due also to Premier Peters, whose serious illness we greatly regret, for having manfully upheld the Prohibition in his efforts to carry out the law. Anything which would tend to weaken the Prohibition Law would be a public calamity.

And now John D. Rockefeller chips in a modest \$100,000 to help on the local option campaign.

Magistrate Kay in Moncton the other day jailed two Scott Act violators the day after they made the illegal sales. As a terror to evil doers he is O. K.

Mr. Bourassa who resigned his seat in the House of Commons to battle with the Gouin Government, will, it is said, become a special correspondent in the press gallery at Ottawa.

Traffic through the new Brooklyn Tunnel is reported to be booming, fifty thousand people having passed through it in two hours last Saturday. We'll beat that when we get our Tunnel, if some of us have to make double trips.

The Hindoo question in the Transvaal has grown serious. The Transvaal Government has imposed drastic legislation against the incoming of Hindoos and treats all who come as criminals. These new regulations were approved by the British Colonial Secretary, Lord Elgin, as he says, because he was threatened with rebellion if he refused! The effect of this action in the Transvaal and similar exclusive action in other British dependencies upon the population in India is becoming alarming. Intelligent Indians raise the cry that the British boast of liberty and equal rights is a sham and a delusion. Three hundred millions of East Indians—three fourths of the population of the Empire—may not be thus trifled with without trouble. Empires have been dismembered for much less cause than this.

### CANADIAN AND U. S. BANKS.

Among many contrasts between the Canadian and United States banking systems is the small number of Canadian banks and their large average capital as compared with the multitude of banks in the Republic and their small average capital. Canadian banks are becoming fewer as the wealth of the country grows. In 1896 there were 38 chartered banks in Canada where there are now but 34 and the number will be in the near future reduced to 33 by another amalgamation. It is also to be noticed that the average capitalisation of Canadian chartered banks is \$2,820,000 each.

In the United States there were three years ago 5,244 national banks with an average paid-up capital of only \$153,200 each, besides over 6,000 state banks and nearly 3,000 private and saving banks. In Canada the large bank has been favored because of its greater assurance of stability, because it is able to spend whatever may be necessary to secure men endowed with talents of management and directors of wealth who are able and careful financiers. So far the Canadian idea in banking seems to have worked well, and our cousins across the border are giving it considerable attention, as appears by frequent reference in their financial publications and other exponents of public opinion.

The Women's Freedom League in England has adopted the motto, "No taxation without representation" as their watchword for 1908. It applies to those women who have to pay direct taxes such as income tax, property and other taxes, and the inhabited house duty. The proposal is to refuse payment, submit to have their property seized and sold, and so on. In some cases, perhaps, a friend may bid it in and save loss, but the leaders anticipate loss and suffering to be cheerfully borne if necessary, in order to make the lawmakers sit up and take notice.

The Intercolonial Railway in New Brunswick covers the routes from Sackville up the north shore of the Province to Campbellton, with two other lines at approximately right angles from Point du Chene to St. John and from Chatham to Fredericton. There are some nine branches owned and operated by companies, and the people of the Province appear desirous that the Government shall acquire and operate them all. Six of the nine more than paid their way last year, and the whole taken together earned \$10,000 over their working expenses. The interests of P. E. Island would be most undoubtedly best served by having the Sackville Tormentine branch made a part of the Government system. The whole matter will come up in Parliament some of these days.

### FOR SENATE REFORM.

Here is the story of the Canadian Senate, its working days and its cost, as it was in 1895 and in 1906, told in four lines:

Session of 1895	Session of 1906-07
Length of Session . . . . . 97 days	157 days
Sittings of Senate . . . . . 54	62
Number of Senators . . . . . 72	87
Indemnity . . . . . \$76,548	\$210,140

Just a word of comment: The Senate costs almost three times as much as it did twelve years ago. The statement that the venerable Upper House was sitting 62 days during the last parliamentary session of 157 days is altogether misleading. Many of the Senate's "days" are but of a few minutes duration. Very few of them last over two or three hours. For this brief, perfunctory service each Senator draws \$2,500 a year from the treasury. Is not Senate reform needed?

An order in Council has been passed at Ottawa since Hon. Mr. Lemieux's return from Japan providing that immigrants will only be admitted to Canada when coming direct from their native country or the country of their adopted citizenship. This applies to all countries alike. It will stop the Japanese influx from Honolulu and the United States. While it may be the best that can be done it is open to the objection that Canada will thus shut out desirable immigrants who may come by way of the United States, while the latter country will still receive many Europeans who first land at Canadian ports.

The most prosperous section of Canada at present is the maritime section, and no part of that section is more prosperous than Prince Edward Island.

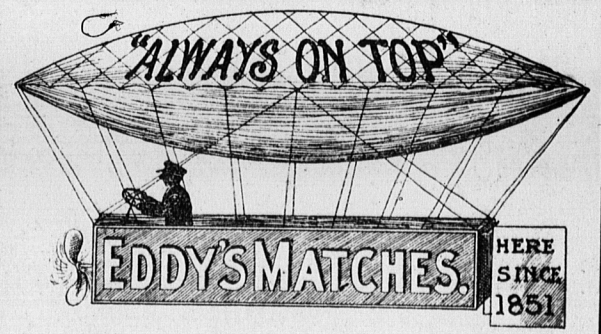
