Hamilton Man Beats George Robison In Play-Off For Title

MONTREAL, Sept. 9.—F. R. Martin of Hamilton, is the newly crowned champion of the Canadian Golf Association. He succeeded to the title previously held by the veteran George S. Lyon, of Toronto, by defeating George Robison, of the Hamilton Golf Club, Toronto, in an 18-hole play-off, the two having ended the 36-hole competition in a tie at 161.

Today Martin showed the fighting characteristics which brought him the Canadian amateur championship twice, in 1902 and 1910. In fourth place on Wednesday with an 83, four strokes behind the leader, George Robison, Martin had a brilliant 78, in the second round, while Robison was a trifle below his first day's form with an 82 added to his 79.

But it was in the play-off that the Hamiltonian, playing in his first round, showed the fighting spirit of a champion. He was slow to start, but once settled down he clicked off pars and birdies smartly, making the turn in 40, while Robison took a 41. Martin reached his greatest pinnacle when the contest was at its height, coming home in a 38 for his second 78 of the day, while his rival for laurels wavered, recovered and then weakened badly at the seventeenth hole.

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Rotary District Governor Pays Official Visit

Mr. Don J. Buckley, of Sydney, Rotary District Governor for the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, paid his first visit to Charlottetown Thursday since his election.

Mr. Buckley accompanied by his son arrived by the Hochelaga. In the afternoon he held a conference with the Directors. In the evening he was the chief speaker at a meeting of the Club. The President, Dr. MacMillan, presided, and introduced the District Governor, who gave an interesting and inspiring talk on the "World-wide Growth of Rotary."

Using a map of the world, Mr. Buckley showed the remarkable spread of the movement within a comparatively short time, until today there are 2700 clubs in 42 different countries, with a membership of 130,000 and an average percentage attendance of 87. "There must be something in the movement after all," he said, "in view of these figures."

Governor Buckley referred to the conference which he attended at Chicago, following the Ostend convention, and then spoke of the District Conference to be held in Newfoundland on June 25th and 29th. This he regarded as his own conference, and he was desirous of making it a success. To do so he would need the hearty co-operation of all the clubs in the district. He pointed out that the balance of trade between the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland in 1926 was 2,000 in the United States, 265 in Great Britain and Ireland. Clubs will likely be established for the first time in Germany after a conference of international officers in Zurich.

The speaker then elaborated the six objects of Rotary, including the ideal of service as a basis of standing over pride, high ethical standards in business and professions, the application of the Rotary ideal to professional business and private life, the development of acquaintanceship as an opportunity for service, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the advancement of universal peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men, united in the ideals of Rotary.

Fitting reference was made to the celebration of Canada's Jubilee, and in this connection the speaker stressed the need of cultivating a world understanding between the different peoples of the world. He also spoke of the part Rotary was playing in the movement to bring about universal peace.

In conclusion he quoted the words of Arthur Sapp, the International President, who advised the Rotarians to take Rotary seriously in order that the world would be brighter and life made sweeter.

Thursday's meeting was made the regular monthly meeting, the minutes being read by the Secretary, J. M. Murley.

At the close the District Governor held a conference with the chairman of Committees.

TWIN ACTION BILL AT THE STRAND

The long waited for pictures of the Dempsey Sharkey fight opened a two days engagement at the Strand last night. Followers of the manly art of Jack Dempsey make his first essay in his effort to regain his lost crown and judge for themselves if the fight was won on a foul.

Sharkey who went down to defeat has a habit of wearing his trunks too high which makes it difficult to judge if there was a foul. Those who see the pictures of the Sharkey-Maloney fight will remember that the referee stopped the fight in the third round to lower Sharkey's trunks to the proper level. However each one must judge for himself and the only way to do this is—see the pictures.

Striking a new and pleasing note in Western drama, Tom Tyler's latest F. B. O. release, "Lightning Lariats," opened yesterday at the Strand Theatre. THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 9.—(Eggs) The general condition of Canadian egg markets is unchanged today.

Toronto—This market continues firm with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered cases returned, extras 46, firsts 41 to 42, seconds 34 to 35. Prices of fresh to retailers are: Extras 50 to 52, firsts 45 to 47; seconds 38 to 39, storage extras 44 to 45, firsts 41 to 42, seconds 38 to 39.

Montreal—Egg prices here are unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, extras 43 to 46, firsts 40 to 43, seconds 33 to 36. Extras are scarce and in demand but there is a plentiful supply of other grades.

Edmonton—The egg market here is holding steady. Dealers are quoting country shippers. Extras 35, firsts 32, seconds 27. Prices to retailers are extras 40, firsts 38, seconds 32.

Calgary—This egg market shows no change from previous reports. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 32 to 33, firsts 30, seconds 25. Fresh receipts are very small and dealers are relying largely on storage.
