A GREAT scarcity of coal is reported in Pictou. The Stanley was unable to fill her bunkers and she had to go to Louisburg for the amount received.

THE S. S. City of Ghent arrived from Halifax about half-past eight yesterday morning, with a general cargo. Her outward cargo included 1200 bags of oats for London.

THE S. S. Bonavista which arrived in port late Thursday evening sailed shortly afternoon yesterday. She left about noon for St. John's Nfld., via Sydney. Her outward cargo included 48 cattle, 170 sheep 1500 bags oats and 200 bales hay.

SHORTLY after seven o'clock last night an event which attracted a large crowd occurred in the yard of the house on Hobbs' Corner occupied by Carr. It appears that two well known pugilists were endeavoring to settle differences by physical persuasion, apparently against the will of the occupants of the house and in consequence a message was sent to the police station, and the Marshall and Police-men Hooper with their usual agility left for the scene of disorder. Before they arrived a runner announced within the gates that the cops were appearing in the distance and the affray was adjourned. When the police arrived they found a very large company of sight seers. The officers searched the yard in vain but as they were leaving a woman came out and the police entered the house, and almost at the same instant a young man came out from the front door, followed by Policeman Hooper, but he was afterwards released. A second young fellow entertained the crowd at the door with filthy language. The police re-entered the house and at that instant a woman fainted. A doctor was sent for and it was some time before peace prevailed.

A LITTLE girl, 14 years old, arrived in Bangor Tuesday night, on the late train from St. John. She came from Prince Edward Island and was going to a house on Broadway. She alighted from the train at the western station and stood looking for a policeman or a hackman. A man came along and asked her what she was looking for and she told him. He said that he would get her a carriage and then asked her if she had any money. The little girl had just 50 cents and she gave it to him. He walked with her to the corner of Main and May Streets and then told her to wait until he returned with the carriage. She waited for an hour, but the man never came back and the carriage did not arrive. Finally the girl broke down and began to cry. She called to a man who was going down on the opposite side of the street and went to her rescue. She told him her story and he went with her to the Bangor House stables, where the police were notified of the case by telephone. Patrolman Baher, who is acting as captain of the night squad, had the girl sent to her destination on Broadway and then started his men on a search for the thief, whom the girl described as a very tall man with a black moustache. If the thief is caught the police ought to give everyone a chance to kick him from the Bangor House to the foot of Exchange Street. The most severe punishment that a man can receive is what one like him ought to get.—Bangor Daily News.
