The Lunenburg arrived in port yesterday afternoon at 4 p. m. a car of sundries for Entry and Amharst consisted of the shipments from here.

Joseph McLean an important witness in the McKenzie trial was conducted to Georgetown yesterday afternoon by constable John McDonald.

The Electra came into port last evening at 7:15 p. m. There were four passengers. John Haggard, Charles Harris and Percy A. Amour came in by last evening's regatta.

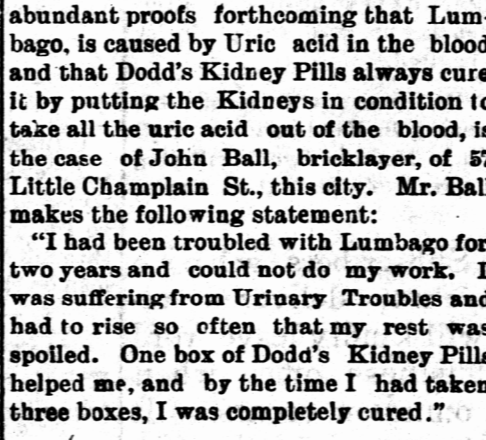
Many are of the opinion that the time has come for the trustees of the Georgetown school to appoint a trustee officer. Complaints have reached The Guardian re the number of children who absent themselves from school. At the last annual school meeting a sum was voted for this purpose and we see no justifiable reason for the delay.

The adjourned assault case of Hessian vs McKenzie was continued last night before the Magistrates. Joseph McLean was the only witness examined who swore in effect: I remember the morning of the 29th. I was at McKenzie's. I think it was about half past ten o'clock the previous night McKenzie and I went to bed. We were talking a spell before we went to sleep. I don't know what time it was when McKenzie said he wanted a smoke and asked me to come down stairs with him. I did and when he had his smoke we started back to bed. He carried the lamp in his hand and on the top of the stairs we were talking about the Brooklyn Theatre song. He continued holding the lamp in his hand. His wife appeared at the foot of the stairs and told us to make less noise as there was a sick man in the house and the priest was coming. With that McKenzie turned around apparently to speak to me, and the lamp landed some distance down the stairs. Mrs McKenzie said the house would be on fire and while attempting to put out the flame her dress caught. I picked up a mat and threw it around her and when I got it out I walked away from McKenzie's. McKenzie himself disappeared and I cannot say where he went. Mrs McKenzie was in the sick room most of the night. I don't know what time it was. I suppose it was nearly morning. I saw or heard no quarrel between McKenzie and his wife and there was no swearing. He made no threats while I was with him. After a brief consideration of the evidence the Magistrate decided that there was not sufficient evidence to convict the prisoner and he was discharged. A D McPhee the senior Magistrate, in his address said the evidence was very conflicting; McKenzie for example swore that McLean was not present when the accident occurred, while McLean swore he was talking to him. He cautioned McKenzie to discontinue keeping such a house and discharged the prisoner.
