SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. JAMES R. ELLIOTT

Mr. James R. Elliott, of Elliott's Mills died under sad circumstances at Georgetown on Thursday night, Mr. Elliott had gone there on the regular train from Charlottetown on that day with the intention of crossing to the Mainland yesterday.

He had supper at the Globe Hotel and left the hotel in the evening to go aboard the steamer. About 1.30 p. m., some boys from the Car ferry steamer found Mr. Elliott lying prostrate on the street, between McDonald's Hotel and R. R. Jenkins' store. When discovered Mr. Elliott was almost dead. He was carried into the railway station and Dr. Barnes was summoned as quickly as possible but before he arrived Mr. Elliott had passed away.

An inquest was held yesterday morning and the result was a verdict of death from heart failure. Deceased was 67 years of age and a man of splendid physique. He conducted the well-known Elliott's Mills as his father had done before him and was much sympathized in the bereaved family in their sad loss. Due notice as to the time of the funeral, which will take place from the residence of Mr. R. A. Elliott, Elliott's Mills, will appear later.

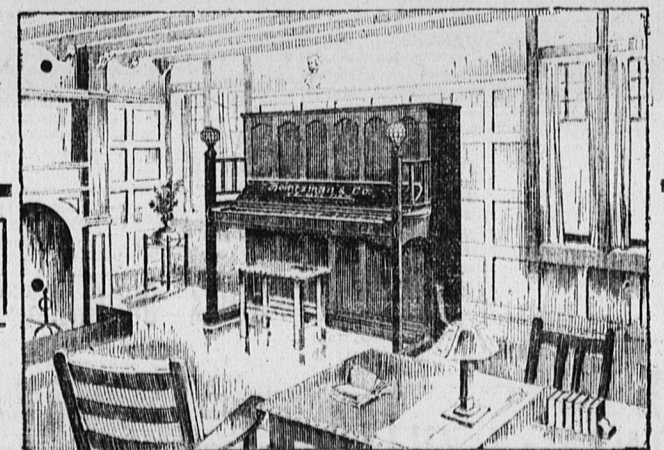
