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Ice-Breaker Back From Patrol Of Northern Waters

QUEBEC, Nov. 7 — (CP) — The "Great Fat Seal", friend of the Eskimos along Hudson Strait, slid into Quebec harbor today for a welcome from smelt-fishermen lining the waterfront and a tooted greeting from every ship in sight.

It was the Transport Department's ice-breaker, N.B. McLean returning from annual patrol of the northern grain route through Hudson Strait and Bay of Churchill. Capt. Charles Antoine Caron, 48-year-old skipper from L'Islet, Que., guided the stubby, 250-foot ice-breaker for the eighth season of lighting navigation beacons, supplying wireless outposts, lighthouses and missions and keeping track of drifting ice.

The N.B. McLean was away since July 8 and travelled 7,213 miles as watchdog for 16 grain vessels that made the northern navigation season one of the heaviest in recent years.

Dr. Bernard Laramee of Montreal, 28-year-old physician engaged by the Department of Indian Affairs, treated Eskimos at four missions and in the neighborhood of three Government wireless stations visited by the Transport Department ship.

The slim, bearded doctor brought back two Eskimos—14-year-old Angothingok and 16-year-old Moussee—who require hospital care. Angothingok's sight is affected by cataracts due to the blinding Arctic combination of sunlight and snow. Moussee is a victim of tuberculosis.

The ice-breaker also brought back to civilization for the first time in three years, Oblate Father Marcel Rio, in charge of a Roman Catholic mission at Coral Harbor on Southampton Island.

With the 50-year-old priest who has been on Arctic mission work 24 years was an Eskimo boy of 13 called Puitlik who will study with the Oblate Fathers in Montreal. At the moment, Puitlik speaks only Eskimo but understands the Morse code.

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Nov. 5.—(AP) — The liner Queen Mary goes into drydock tomorrow to have a 50-ton concrete patch removed from her hull. The patch was poured in after her hull was torn on a reef during a storm last January. The next sailing to New York is scheduled for Dec. 10.

G.B.S. Sees Danger Of Another War

LONDON, Nov. 7 — (Reuters) — George Bernard Shaw, who at 93 is still writing plays and having them produced on the London stage, says in the first exclusive article he has written for more than a year that Britain is in grave danger of plunging into another war.

"We should now be at war with Russia," he says in an analysis of British foreign policy, "were it not for the ability of Prime Minister Stalin, and the death of Stalin would be the worst calamity to be feared just now."

Shaw suggests that Opposition leader Winston Churchill — the first to recognize the eminence of Lenin — should tell British platform politicians who never speak of Stalin unless they insult him that he is not a "bloodstained guttersnipe" but "the mainstay of peace in Europe."

Shaw says all political parties are agreed that Britain will starve for a military victory when she unless she produces more by hard work, that there is too much budgeting for leisure by the workers, and that if the Labor Party is defeated at the next general election it will be because of its failure to carry out its promises to lower domestic prices by nationalization.

Of British voters who are "uneducated politically," Shaw says they should know that civilization is impossible without a broad basis of Communism, and that Communism cannot develop without a top dressing of private enterprise.

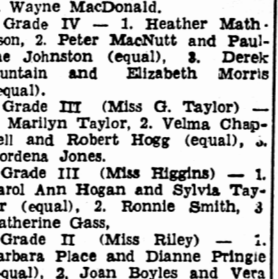
