EASTERN NOTES.—The summer is unusually cool, and the hay crop is likely to be a short one. The wheat crop is by no means promising, some farmers plowing up the ground and sowing it with barley. The country now looks its best, and is certainly a paradise to the tourist from the sweltering cities of the south, or even the citizens of our own land. Your genial fellow townsman L. E. Prowse made a flying visit last week, and his success in fishing in the placid waters of East Lake was as remarkable as his success in mercantile and political ventures. The number of trunks coming east from Souris station warn us that the season has arrived when our boys and girls are returning from the domains of Uncle Sam to their native land to rest their bodies and their minds, visit relatives and friends, and enjoy themselves till short days and cool nights remind them that the time for their southern migration has again arrived.—The codfish season is about upon the south side, the fishermen have moved their trawls closer to the shore where hake are beginning to arrive in considerable quantities. A large body of herring of fine quality is now in these waters one species, the largest, has not been seen here before for twenty years.

A Rise in Teas.

MONTREAL, July 5.—Owing to the war in the east, China teas have advanced here from a cent to 2 1/2 cents a pound. There has also been an advance in Japan teas, and importers say that stock is hard to get. Great fear is expressed that the use of steamship lines for military purposes in the Pacific may seriously interfere with future shipments.

THE HOME OF THE PLAGUE.

Why the Pestilence is Bred in Chinese Cities.

[London Leader.]

One who has seen any of the towns and cities of China wonders little why disease and plague are prevalent. A correspondent in China writes that he recently went to Foochow, a town near the east coast, which is approached by way of the river Myn, one of the most picturesque waterways in the whole of the Celestial Empire.

Ships have to anchor at the customs pagoda, from which persons are conveyed to Foochow by sampan or steam launch, the distance being about ten miles.

Foochow is considered one of the most filthy and over-crowded towns in China, and a person landing there cannot fail to notice the fact immediately he sets foot on shore. Everywhere there are teeming masses of dirty, ragged and half-starved looking Celestials. The streets (alleyways would be a better term) are only about eight feet wide and all metalled or paved, with irregular lumps of stone or rock. On each side there are stagnant gutterways, which emit most obnoxious perfumes, causing one to hold a handkerchief to his nostrils the whole time he has to traverse the roads.

In the terrible hot weather the Chinaman places a plank of wood from his doorway to the street across the gutter, and takes his night's sleep perhaps without a covering, perhaps in the clothes he has not had off for weeks.

Nearly every building is a shop, and outside every three or four are placed buckets of garbage—in some places holes full of it—which add to the sickening stench of the gutters. Every now and again one hears loud shouting in front or behind him, which is an indication that all on foot must clear the way for some chair carriers, who are carrying upon their shoulders some important personage.

The sight on the main bridge spanning the river, cannot be accurately described. Each side was crowded with stalls with goods of every description—dirty looking tumble-down affairs. Cripples and beggars were numerous, and there were also lepers; there were men with terrible sores, and two Chinamen lay half-naked on the roadway, dying. There is a law in yogue in Foochow that the first person who shall touch a man so dying shall bury him. Very few, however, receive burial if they die on the bridge. The person who is unfortunate enough to touch the dead one waits until dark, and then, as the Americans say, 'dumps' the departed into the river. Bodies are found nearly every day floating among the shipping, or half-buried in the mud when the water is low.

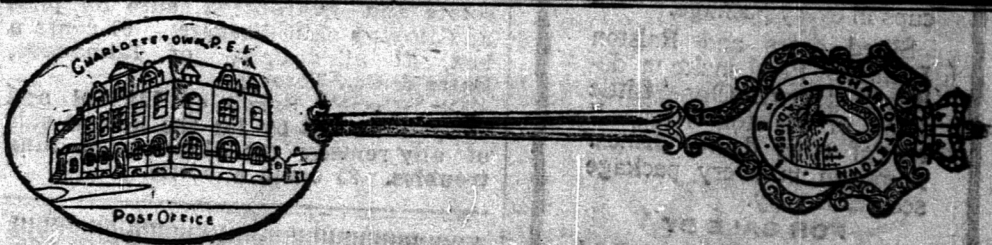
