WHAT TAFT SAID ABOUT THE RECIPROCITY TREATY.

DEXTER, Ohio, May 13—President Taft in a speech here today, referred to "reciprocity as a thing that is dead."

"They tell me that this is a Roosevelt town," was his opening remark to the crowd that met his train.

"It is," yelled a man on the station platform.

"They say you are against me," continued the president, "because I was in favor of reciprocity. Well I was. I was in favor of reciprocity because I believe it would be good for the farmers and every other class."

"We sell of foodstuffs and agricultural products to Canada four times what they sell to us," declared Mr. Taft. "They cannot raise corn up there, they can only raise the hardiest cereals and it would be of great benefit to the farmers, but the thing is dead."

"Now what I want to say to you is that you are utterly illogical in opposing me on account of reciprocity when the fact is that before I entered into reciprocity at all I wrote to Theo Roosevelt and consulted him about it and told him all the arguments both ways. He commended me most highly for going into the business and approved it in every way. Now that he finds that reciprocity is not popular with the farmers he recants and says that well, he has changed his mind about it."

MORE ABOUT WIRELESS.

BUFFALO, N. T., May 11—Frank West Prentice, a Toronto electrical engineer, in an address last night, before the central railway club here, gave some details of experiments which he declares demonstrate conclusively that electricity transmitted for power or commercial purposes by wireless really increases in velocity and power the farther it goes from the point of origin.

Discussing the commercial use of wireless power, Mr. Prentice suggested that for automobiles and motor trucks, receiving harps be placed on the machine and wave wires installed at intervals in the roadway, energy being drawn through the air to operate the machine. A firing machine with a small high frequency motor could, according to Mr. Prentice, fly at a height of 3,000 feet and draw sufficient power from a wave wire along the ground. By a similar device it will be found possible he believes to operate trains at a great saving from the present cost.

KRUPP GETS CONTRACT.

MELBOURNE, Australia, May 13—The Victorian minister of railways seeks to justify giving large contracts to the German firm of Krupp on the ground that the public safety required it, alleging that certain British tyres failed to answer the tests of Australian agents. British engineering firms resent this defence, declaring the reputation of British tyres to be high throughout the world, and that German tyres are not used in the leading English railways.

ISMAY WILL CONTRIBUTE.

LONDON, May 14—The London papers publish a statement made by the Liverpool Journal of Commerce, that J. Bruce Ismay intends to provide an endowment fund for pensions for disabled seamen of all classes connected with the White Star line and for their widows, as a thanks offering and a memorial to the heroism of the Titanic's crew. The fund is further said will probably amount to \$100,000.

WILL INCREASE THE SALARIES OF RECTORS.

MONTREAL, May 13—The campaign to raise \$250,000 for the augmentation of the salaries of Anglican pastors in the diocese of Montreal was opened today by Bishop Farthing. At midday a luncheon was held, attended by many prominent Church workers, at which it was announced that \$70,000 had been promised. Tonight, while the official figure had not been contemplated, it was stated that this sum had been considerably increased during the afternoon.

TORONTO, May 12—After a series of meetings held in Toronto during the past three days, the Brotherhood Federation of Canada has been formed, corresponding with the various brotherhoods and men's organizations which aim at winning men for Christian manhood citizenship.

A delegation of 132 from the old country and a few women representing the related sisterhood movement are in Canada for the purpose of encouraging, inspiring and giving to Canadian men the benefit of their experience. Most of these visitors occupied pulpits in Toronto and Hamilton yesterday morning and evening.

The organization was effective in meetings of members of the various Canadian brotherhoods held Saturday afternoon and evening. There were present not only several hundred men from Toronto, brotherhoods of various churches, and some of no church, but also men from various points in Canada from Regina to Montreal, besides the visitors from Great Britain.

CUP FOR CADETS.

TORONTO, May 13—Dr. Orr, Secretary of the Canadian National Exhibition, has received a telegram from Colonel Lowther, secretary to H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, stating that King George has been pleased to donate a cup for competition between squads of the Imperial Cadets at the National Exhibition this autumn. It is expected that Cadet Corps from the Mother Country and every one of the Over Seas Dominions will be represented.

THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

OTTAWA, May 13—The city council to-night approved of the report of the federal district committee to make Ottawa the national capital. It will go to the government endorsed by the board of trade and city council.

It asks for a commission to report on the area to be included, the form of government to be adopted, distribution of legislative powers, arrangements with the province of Ontario revenue and finance.

ARMY IS FINED.

QUEBEC, May 13—Notwithstanding a ruling of the recorder's court against the Salvation Army, the latter had another outdoor parade yesterday and held a meeting on the Montcalm Market Square, which attracted a large crowd. On the other hand, Adjutant McCrea, commanding officer of the Salvation Army in Quebec, has not yet paid the fine of \$10, to which Recorder Dery condemned him recently for a similar alleged offence, and he formally declared that he will not pay it, regardless of the consequences.

WAS RECAPTURED.

MONTON, N. B., May 11—Ben LeBlanc, who escaped from the Provincial Hospital, Lancaster, on Monday last, was captured this morning by the local police. He had some money, also keys identified as belonging to the Dominion Textile Company, a quantity of canned goods and small articles. Last night the office of the Dominion Textile Company was broken into. Doctor Anglin will confer with the attorney-general. It is not known whether or not LeBlanc will be taken back to the hospital or not.

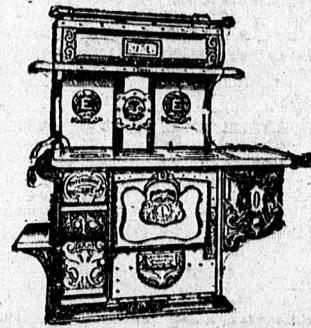

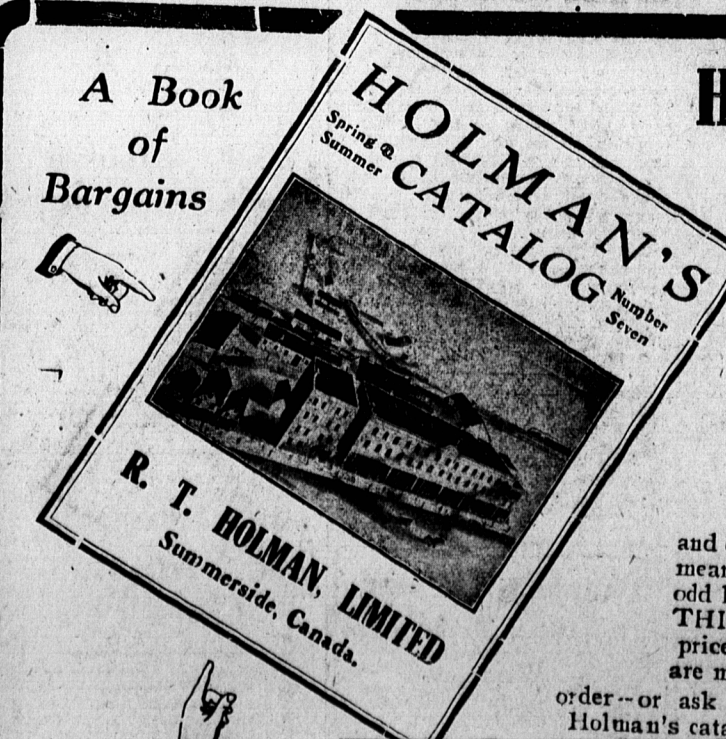
