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Literature And Life

LANGUAGE 'If a language would live, it must eat' says a modern literary critic, and the goes on to say that the English language, in all its time of best health, has been a good feeder, if not a gross eater. Nothing that had a mind to ever stuck in its throat, or failed to turn into good, flesh-forming stuff in its gizzard. Look on the way it has browsed on all technical jargons of sport, from hawking to golf, picking out every term or figure apt for literary use. And the way it set to, when the Great War came, and packed up every crumb of pithy idiom it could find in the new vocabulary which came of new methods of fighting, or on the lips of enemies or allies.

WORDS often creep in without a certificate from authority, and as far as pronunciation is concerned we often hear over the radio commentators mispronouncing words. For instance we hear especially in these days of meetings, "delights". And this "into for unto". Then there is that overworked word which grates on one's ear—"contact", as "we contacted him", or "try to contact him".

MUSIC is made up as we know of sounds, some high, some low; some long, some short. So sentences are formed by placing words in a certain order. Then as the sculptor fingers almost lovingly the piece of marble which he has to deal with, and in which he sees with the eye of imagination the figure he is to create and release; or as the workman in brass does the same thing to his material, so there are words that we in a sense love to handle—to say over and hear their sound. Such words are "burnish", "lustre", "beatitude", "dawn", and "rosesmary".

OF course words take on new significance when we think of their context—their company, and the situations in which they are used. It has for instance been pointed out that the word "dust" is found in places which give it some significance. We hear it at funerals "dust to dust"; it will still return to the earth as it was "the way to ship-dealing". "Dust has closed Helen's eyes". "Shall honour's voice provoke the silent dust?" "All follow this and come to dust."

WORDS are made into songs like those which Burns gave us, or into speeches like those which Mr. Churchill made and saved England in 1940, and these same words of our common speech lie there for the unborn of another age to use to marshal their thoughts for great issues in song or story.

No one says just what he would like to say for who can unpeck his soul with words? The poet Ben Ezra says that often thought breaks through language and escape. "This comes out in a Hebrew Psalm, the 27th, and verse 13. We notice that the first part of the verse is in italics—"I had fainted." This is not the original
