Parnell O'Hara, Captain Allan McLean, in command, sailed from Victoria Wednesday for Glace Bay, C. B. Her cargo, loaded by Wright Bros., was composed of 1760 bushels of potatoes, 600 bushels of turnips, 1300 bushels of white oats, 500 bushels of black oats, 50 bushels of garden vegetables and 15 lbs. of butter.—The Schr. Kitchener, Captain S. Mosher in command, arrived in Victoria Wednesday with a cargo of coal for Wright Bros. When her cargo is discharged she will be loaded with produce.—V.
