PRIZE-WINNING "PICCADILLY INCIDENT" OFFERS ANNA NEAGLE IN GRIPPING FILM

The picture which won England's Gold Medal Award (equivalent of our Academy Award) is now on view at the Capitol Theatre with the showing of "Piccadilly Incident," starring the internationally celebrated Anna Neagle and Michael Wilding.
