Yesterday there was a good deal of interest aroused in this city in the recent Skerry death in Alberton which was increased by different reports in circulation throughout the day. One of these reports, for which there is no other authority than the words repeated from one party to another, and which has no definite origin, is to the effect that a newly dug grave was found in Cunningham's field in Alberton near the same of the supposed drowning accident.

In this grave it is said that there was discovered a set of artificial teeth and this circumstance is connected with Skerry's death by the fact that when found the latter's set of teeth were missing. At the time however it was supposed that the man had lost them in his last moments and the utensils used for grappling for the body would not likely bring them to the surface.

These new reports, if substantiated later, will put a new appearance on the latest tragedy in the western town and it would appear as if there was room for some further enquiry. Another report current was that two parties had rather suddenly and mysteriously disappeared from Alberton, but whether or not their absence can be connected with the unfortunate death of W. J. Skerry cannot be ascertained.

The gravity of these reports led the Attorney General as to the action to be taken by his department in the case. It was learned that the department is waiting for something more definite before taking any further investigation.
