PARIS, May 26.—The Correctional Tribunal has condemned Count Claude de Choiseul-Praslin, and M. Van der Piere, an art expert, to pay fines of 3,000 francs each for a peculiar exchange with M. Walter, a dealer, of a pearl necklace worth \$18,000 for five paintings by old masters. This transaction was sentenced to pay a fine of 500 francs, and the court awarded M. Walter compensation in the sum of 27,000 francs.
