BRITISH BUTCHERS.

Fully Alive to the Question of Admitting Canadian Store Cattle.

At a meeting of the National Federation of Butchers, held recently at Manchester, England, Mr. Charles E. Pearson, the president, dealing with the subject of free importation of Canadian cattle to England, said when this class of cattle was first introduced into that country, some years ago, it met a long felt want. The beasts were well-grown, full of condition, and plenty of bone, and when fattened for the market, were exactly what traders desired to purchase. Moreover, their introduction had the effect of reducing the price of store cattle from £2 or £3 per head. For some time past he had been more or less in communication with different men interested in this particular line of the trade, and they said to him, "You butchers have only one object in view and that is to reduce the price of meat." He admitted that was their aim. They should use every effort and strain every nerve to effect reduction in the price. They were anxious to feed the public well with a plentiful supply of good meat. He thought if they could bring influence to bear upon the Government, and secure the free importation of Canadian cattle to England, they would not only benefit themselves, but also their colonial brethren. The Government could not be forgetful of the way the Canadian troops had served in South Africa, and he thought the present was a good opportunity for trying to have the embargo on cattle from Canada. What they must first do was to prove to Mr. Hanbury, the Minister of Agriculture, that there was no disease among cattle in Canada at present, and that there had not been for years, and that there was an urgent need in England for this class of cattle.

Mr. E. A. Tootle of Birkenhead said that recently he was in conversation with an American shipper, whom he questioned as to the prospect of the importation of Canadian cattle into England. His friend very emphatically answered, "Yes, if they will let Canadians come to England, there will be a lot of Americans coming over also." He asked him what foundation he had for such a statement, and the reply was that the boundaries dividing the two countries in the cattle-raising districts were so undefined that it would be easy for large numbers of American cattle to cross into Canada, and be thence shipped to England. On the other hand a toll had to be paid on Canadian cattle before they could pass through the States.

Other gentlemen having spoken, the following resolution was passed unanimously: "This meeting is emphatically of opinion that, owing to the present and prospective short supplies of beef, the Government should now permit the South American cattle to be landed in this country under the same conditions as those from the United States, and, further, that the Government should take the legislative measures necessary to remove the present embargo on Canadian store cattle."

QUEEN'S SCARF FOR A CANADIAN.

In concluding the recent departmental reports, Lord Roberts says he wishes to record the fact that in April, 1900, Queen Victoria entrusted him with four woollen scarfs worked by herself, which she desired to be distributed to four distinguished private soldiers of the colonial contingents of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and South Africa. The selection of the recipients in each case was left to the colonial officer commanding the contingent. The Canadian scarf goes to Private now Lieutenant, Richard Rowland Thompson of the Royal Canadian Regiment, for personal gallantry in the field.

The Natal "Speaker."

Mr. Hulett, who has recently been re-elected Speaker of the Legislative Assembly in Natal, is an old and prominent colonist, who has done great service to Natal outside of politics, says The Daily Graphic. It was owing to Mr. Hulett's enterprise that the tea-growing industry was established in the "Garden Colony," and he has always been foremost in promoting the general interests of that part of South Africa.

Roy McLeod left yesterday by the Princess for Sydney where he will enter the branch of the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island there as manager.

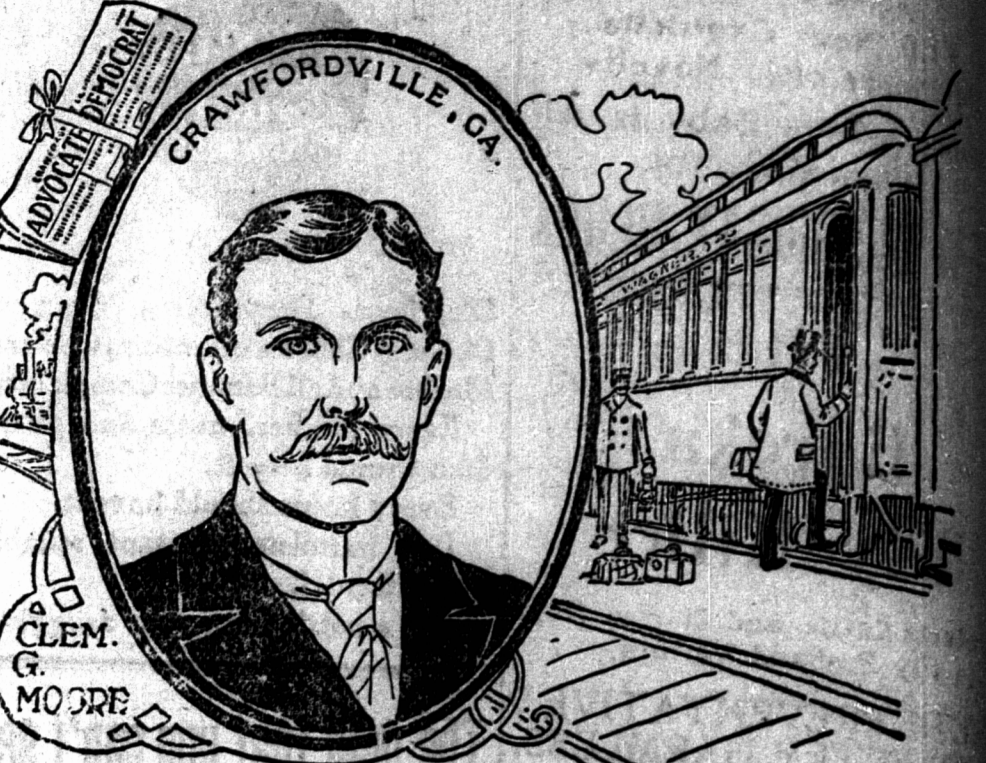

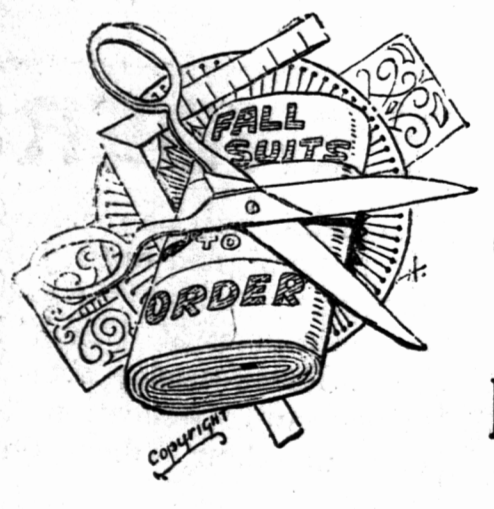
