KEEP TROOPS IN EUROPE U. S. PUBLIC BACKS BYRNES

Stay in Germany Policy Favored Poll Finds

By American Institute of Public Opinion

PRINCETON, Sept. 16 — Secretary of State Byrnes warning at Stuttgart that the United States is not going to "pull out" of Germany or Europe has solid support from American public opinion.

Observers versed in foreign affairs will likely find the poll result significant in the light of predictions that have often been made as to how the public would react to continued chaos and trouble in Europe.

Today's poll indicates that such a reaction is far from present now. The country's vote is as follows:
