PROV. COUNCIL BOY SCOUTS ANNUAL MTG.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Council of the Boy Scouts Association was held in the board room of the City Hall last evening, the President, Mr. J. R. Burnett, presiding.

The Provincial Commissioner (Mr. W. Warren) reported on outdoor activities of the Scouts, especially with regard to the successful summer camp, and suggested that more men interested in boys work should volunteer their services at sold camps, even if they were not trained Scout leaders.

The past year has been a very encouraging one for Scouting in P. E. Island, particularly in Charlottetown, Summerside and Bedouque.

The census shows that we now have 152 active Scouts and Rovers, ten Rover Squires and seventy Cubs, and twenty-four Leaders, making a total of 246 active members of the association.

Rovering has progressed slowly with only one scout and two leaders meeting all the necessary requirements for Investiture.

The above figures do not include 159 associate members of the Provincial Council, nor members of the various group committees.

During the year Cub Packs were organized in connection with existing troops, in the first Summerside group, Bedouque and Freetown Group, and in the St. James Church Group. Cubbing is gaining in popularity and is proving to be an essential and worth while part of Scouting in this province.

Warrants of appointment signed by His Excellency, the Chief Scout for Canada, were issued to the following:

Mr. R. C. Parent, Cub Master; William Warren, Provincial Commissioner; J. R. Burnett, Provincial President; E. J. Hallett, Assistant Provincial Commissioner; and F. A. Driscoll, Scout Master.

The Gilwell Woods Badge, certificate and neckerchief, were presented to Mr. Wm. Warren, for successfully passing both the practical and theoretical courses in Scouting.

Unit four, Gilwell certificates were issued to the following: - Wm. Warren, Stewart Leigh, Ivan Walsh, Niall Burnett, Sydney MacBeath, Phillip Stavert, Chas. Batt, Wm. Trainor and Harry Pineau.

Mr. Percy Wedge of the Second Summerside Group attended the practical Gilwell Training Course for Leaders at Sussex, N. B., and successfully passed the requirements for the course.

During July and August five organized camps were held, two for Cubs, and three for Scouts. Seventy-eight Scouts and six Leaders attended the Scout Camps and eight Scout Camps and five Leaders the Cub Camps.

The short Cub camps were the first to be held in the province and were so successful that camping for Cubs is assured for the future.

The Bedouque and Freetown Group, mostly first class Scouts, experienced a different type of camping, as the twenty boys and two leaders spent six happy and adventurous days travelling through parts of Nova Scotia.

The Provincial Camp, with Mr. Wm. Warren as Camp Chief, was held at the historic and delightful site of Camp de Roma.

The third annual P.L.'s Conference was held at St. Peter's Church hall on Saturday, October 14, with thirty-six Scouts and Leaders attending. Interesting games were played and practical talks given.

At the banquet the P.L.'s were happy to have as guests the Premier of the Province, Provincial President, Provincial Commissioner, and others. At this function the Rev. G. T. Spriggs, retiring Provincial Commissioner, was presented with a "Thanks Badge" by the Scouts.

King Scout, Phil Stavert and Charles Batt completed their Fisher Body models and entered them in the American wide competition, Stavert's model being good enough to win a \$100 cash prize.

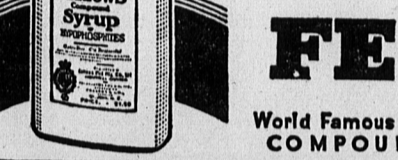

URGES ARMS

Mussolini was understood to have sounded out General Goering—who was dressed in his full uniform—on what concessions Germany is willing to make in her demands for "equality in arms" before the start of a new arms conference.

Await Elections

It was considered most likely that the Italian Premier will make no move to invite Germany, France, Great Britain, and the United States to talk things over until after Nov. 12, when Germans will vote in a plebiscite on the Nazi regime's foreign policy.

Regarding the Danubian rehabilitation, Mussolini was thought to have tried to win Germany as a more fervent adherent of an Italian plan for the recovery of the territory, toward which the Reich's attitude has been uncertain.

Austria was reported to be a subject of the interview today since reports reached government circles that there is great political uneasiness in Austria, particularly as winter approaches.

The fundamental points of II Duce's Danubian project are bilateral accords among the states; preferential treatment for agricultural products of these states, and for the industrial products of Austria; the waiving by outside nations of their most-favored nation treatment rights if they have favorable balances towards these nations, and concessions by the Danubian states of part of their internal market to other countries if those nations grant them preferential duties.

And Sir John Simon, National Liberal leader, declared: "The threat to parliamentary institutions by whatever name we disguise it is the threat of dictatorship and that is the danger from which the national combination of parties has to save Britain."

The three cabinet ministers were speaking at a luncheon tendered them by the Prime Minister's party, the National Labor Party. Coming the day before His Majesty will reopen the House, it was a significant demonstration of unity within the ranks of the tri-party government.
