Don't Suffer GAS PAINS Reseeding For Hay

How is your clover? Is a common question wherever farmers meet in the spring. The general answer throughout most sections of Prince Edward Island in April, 1940, was "It looks good." Letters from phone calls to the Experimental Station, Charlottetown, however, indicate that there were many fields seeded to grass and clover in 1939 that should be reseeded.

The long continued dry weather during the summer and early autumn of 1939 caused strong competition for moisture between the grass and the new seeding and the grass suffered most so that now fields which should have produced large quantities of clover have followed. Some are almost without a blade of grass or a clover plant.

What do you suggest should be done with these fields which will not produce a profitable crop either this year or next if they are not reseeded? We have tried to answer this question individually as the calls came to the Station, and will outline briefly some of the suggestions given.
