THE WAITERS' STRIKE.

Signs that the strike of the waiters is about to collapse are not lacking. With dissension among the leaders and in the ranks, with a treasury that contains no treasure, with every train and steamship entering New York bringing waiters from other cities and the hotel managers holding firm in their refusal to recognize the union, the end cannot be far off.

The strike has simply been resolved into a test of endurance, with the right and public opinion on the side of the hotel managers, for it is inconceivable that any properly managed establishment could afford to do anything that would place the control of its servants in the hands of an irresponsible union that lacks standing even in the labor world.

The public has no sympathy with the waiters, who treated neither their employers nor the public fairly, and who, in fact, practically tried to "hold up" every important hotel and restaurant in New York. True, they used no revolvers or clubs, but by striving when business was at its height in one place after another they deliberately sought to terrorize the proprietors of those places.—N. Y. Herald.

Ormsby McHarg, the manager of the Roosevelt contest at the Chicago convention and who is now an enthusiastic supporter of the colonel's candidacy, was less than two years ago bitterly opposed to any plan to nominate him for the Presidency, and at that time said: "He is the most dangerous figure in public life in America, and if he should be elected President we would have hard work to get him out of the White House again. I believe the time to vote against him is next Tuesday and that is what I propose to do."

It is understood that the track of the Prince Edward Island Railway is to be broadened to the standard gauge, to be in readiness when the Car Ferry is completed. In a previous issue Hon. W. S. Stewart fittingly suggested that an agreement in writing be at once made with the Dominion Government that the P. E. I. Railway machine and repair shops be continued for the standard gauge work which will be required when the above change is made. There should be no time lost in securing this.

Orchard Renewal—Circular No. of the Department of Agriculture Extension, State College, Center Co., Pa.

This is a leaflet of immense value to farmers of P. E. Island having old unprofitable orchards on their farms. It deals with the causes for such orchards being unprofitable and then shows how they may be remedied. It explains how a very high tree with bare branches may be headed back and growth produced lower down, this being nature's way of prolonging the life of the tree. Fertilization of the orchard is then dealt with to a considerable extent, followed by brief paragraphs on cultivation and spraying. TO PROTECT PROPERTY.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—To save religious orders, particularly the Catholic Church from threatened disintegration the Attorneys of the Order of St. Benedict of New Jersey tomorrow will ask the Supreme Court of the United States to review the decision of the eighth United States Court of appeals that the agreement of a monk to convey all his property to his Order was void as against Public Policy. The decision was made in the case of Father Augustine with fifty years a member of the Benedictine Order. At his death a priest of the German Church of Springfield Minn. Court held that his relatives rather than the Order in which he had made vows of chastity, poverty and obedience, were entitled to the \$5,000 property in his name, when he died.

DEPUTIES EXPRESS SYMPATHY.

PARIS, June 7.—The aerial navigation group in the Chamber of Deputies today adopted a resolution of sympathy in regard to the death of Wilbur Wright.

The President of the group, M. Painleve, will send a message to this effect to Orville Wright.

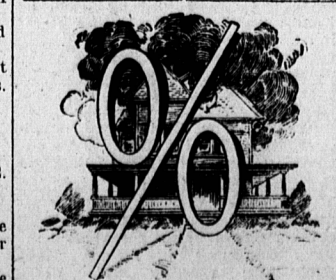
CADET INSTRUCTORS' COURSE.

The Education Department has received notice that a six weeks' course for school teachers, to enable them to qualify as Cadet Instructors, will be held at Halifax, commencing about the 10th of July next. The pay of teachers attending this course will be \$15.00 a day, out of which they will have to pay their own board and lodging. Free transportation will be given to those authorized to attend; and return transportation to those who obtain a certificate.

Fifty teachers from Prince Edward Island are authorized to attend the course. Teachers who desire to take the course and who will go if selected should send their application to the Education Office, Charlottetown, giving the following information:—
1. Name in full (Christian and Surname).
2. The rank, if any, held by them in the Militia.
3. The railway station from which transport will be required, and post office address.
