GENEVA, Oct. 6.—(CP)—Count Johann Henrich von Bernstorff, German ambassador whose assignment in Washington ended with the United States' entry into the Great War in 1917, died today of heart disease, a refugee from his own country since the rise of the Hitler regime.

### Grease Paint Bandit Escapes Police Trap

TORONTO, Oct. 6.—(CP)—A bandit, about as slippery as the grease he uses to disguise himself, escaped a police trap late today, shortly after he robbed a branch bank of \$2,000.

Called the "painted doll" because of the yellow grease paint he smeared on his face to prevent identification, the robber ran into an apartment building after the hold-up. Police threw a cordon around the building and searched each suite systematically. All they found was his discarded windbreaker in the vestibule.

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### Eire Takes Precautions For Neutrality

DUBLIN, Oct. 6.—(CP)—Eire is taking precautions to preserve her neutrality, avoid the effects of the war in Europe and maintain internal peace.

The army, reserve and volunteer forces have been mobilized to watch the coast and to guard all strategic points throughout the state. Plans are being pushed ahead to recruit a special police force to give temporary assistance to the normal force.

While the coast will be guarded as closely as possible it is not believed that Eire is in any danger of being prevented from the Oct. 4 incident when a German submarine landed the crew of the Eireighter Diamantis at Dingle, County Kerry.

### Parliament Has Granted Drastic Emergency Powers to the De Valera Government and Has Approved the Neutrality Policy

Parliament has granted drastic emergency powers to the De Valera government and has approved the neutrality policy. The cabinet has been thoroughly reshuffled and a new ministry for defence coordination has been established. It has the additional duty of looking after censorship. Press censorship is voluntary and editors do not submit their news.

To provide against the possibility of a serious disturbance of the peace, the new justice minister has issued orders for the detention of about 60 prominent persons suspected of complicity in the activities of the outlawed Irish Republican Army. They are to be interned. A commission of two army officers and a lawyer has been set up to hear appeals.

### Good Harvest

Eire has had the best harvest for several years but considerable dissatisfaction exists among farmers because of the fact that the maximum price for Irish produce based on that prevalent last August. Farmers' organizations in the country proposed prices would not induce them to continue in production.

Coal supplies, which come from Britain are plentiful although prices have risen slightly. There is also an excellent peat crop in the country districts. A rationing scheme for gasolene came into force Oct. 2. Private motorists who use their cars only for pleasure are limited to enough gas to take them 250 miles a month.

The U. S. S. R. already has gained important military, naval and air bases in the treaties with Estonia and Latvia.

When discussions with Latvia would be resumed remained a mystery. It also was not known when Turkish foreign minister Sukru Saracoglu would be called to the Kremlin for further conversations.

Some foreign diplomatic observers said it looked as though the Russians would be playing "the original game of patience," in negotiations with the Turks, while watching closely the progress of British-Turkish military talks in London.

Russia was reported to be demanding Turkish neutrality in the war and also, possibly, a mutual assistance pact, in addition to assurance that no British warships other than those of Russia and Turkey would not be allowed to enter the Black Sea through the Dardanelles.

No official comment was forthcoming on Adolf Hitler's speech today to the Reichstag, but unofficially it was reported the speech was welcomed here.

information announced that dispatch of British forces to France is proceeding day and night "without hitch or casualty."

The successful manner in which this operation is being carried out will be outlined by Leslie Hore-Beaumont, war secretary, in his review in the House of Commons next Thursday.

It was announced that war correspondents are being assigned to the British expeditionary force and would start sending dispatches in a few days.

Val circles reported the convey system is working with increased efficiency, merchant-men docking safely from every part of the world. Since the convey system was perfected 10 days ago not one escorted ship has been lost, although one British ship, the 876-ton Glen Faru was reported sunk by a submarine today.

The London statement dismisses Hitler's survey of past events with the assertion that it is "the perversion of the truth which will be readily recognized by the people of this country and indeed the whole world."
