We note with pleasure that Edgar Milligan is starting to make plans for this season's race meetings and will hold one afternoon meeting and two meetings by electric lights. We would not be surprised to see one of these in June. His regular date for the afternoon racing would fall on Wednesday afternoon, July 12th. The new electric light plant is very much more powerful and with the information gained from last year there should be no difficulty in flooding the track with light and making it as bright as day.

George Callbeck has just returned from London, England, where he attended the fur auctions as representative of the Canadian National Fox Breeders Association. George is an enthusiastic horseman and can drive with the best of them. He has two or three good prospects for this year's races and is also one of the stalwarts behind the Summerside July 1st race meeting.

Car-taker James Harper is working at the Charlottetown Driving Park, putting ashes on the roads and paths. He says that there is considerable ice on the turns but that he hopes to have the track in condition and opened up for training the latter part of the month.

Mamie Britton 200 1-2 was a recent winner of the Prix Adrets at Cannes, France, for a purse of 8,000 francs. She was driven by the ex-Russian reinsman, Tsherkasoff.

Venna, Austria had last three days racing last year with purses amounting to about \$120,000. Baden, a short distance from Vienna, had eighteen days with purses aggregating \$33,000. Budapest had ten days racing with purses totaling nearly \$100,000.

Gordon Peters 226 3-4, a full brother of the Senator 203 1-2, and the Great McGregor a full brother of the late McGregor the Great 203 1-2, are credited in the Austrian Trotting Year Book with 19 trotters and 22 trotters respectively that have entered to what is equivalent to the 230 list in that country.

One of the handsome trotters in the United States today is called Z-ne Grey. He is in the Brooke Curry stable at Fairmont, Ind. He has tremendous speed and wherever he appears is the cynosure of all eyes, being snow white and has all the style of a King's horse.

According to the Halifax Herald Marjorie M. 207 3-4 is being offered for sale by owners Kasouf and Jabbe of North Sydney. She is eligible to the 214 pace and we think it would be difficult to find one to beat her in that class.

Parl-Mutual betting has been adopted by several states in the U. S. A. recently and this is claimed to be greatly in favor of racing. No doubt when people are permitted to make a small bet they will be more interested in the races than they would otherwise be.

The fastest mile trotted over the Longwood mile track at Florida this year was by a two year old, on Thursday April 4th, when Sly Mac (2) stepped in 2:12 1-4, the last half in 1:04 3-4. With the great number of three year olds and aged horses being trained there it seems strange that a two year old should be forced to such a clip. Aged horses with records close to two minutes have not beaten 2:20 in their training although given practically the same amount of work.

The system of colt training in vogue at the Southern tracks is one which develops speed quickly, but we think would have injurious after effects. It does not seem reasonable that in a few months a two year old can go from practically nothing to 2:12 and not be injured. The vital organs have not sufficiently matured to stand great strain. Years ago it was very fashionable to train yearlings. One sire we recall had upwards of twenty in the 1st in a single season. We followed them up and found that very few of them if any ever campaigned as four year olds or later, and very few as three year olds. For the wear and tear of later battling the less taken out in the first three years of a horse's life the better for him.

Joe M. McGraw, Washington, Pa., who is a great fighter for the barrier system of starting and is himself the inventor of the one thousand and raced successfully, then sold to Court and Dover, Driving Park, believes that we

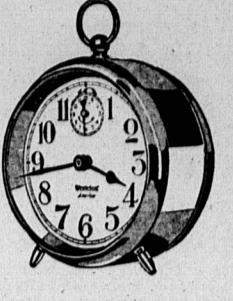

tion most of the day. This is an action for damages for the conversion of the Plaintiff's half interest in one female silver black fox, the amount claimed being \$100. The plaintiff alleged the fox had been left with the defendant; that each owned half the fox and that the defendant was to mate, feed and ranch the fox and the offspring was to be divided equally between them. The defendant's case has not been heard as at the close of the case for the plaintiff, the attorney for the defendant moved for a non suit on the ground that the joint owner of the fox could not maintain an action of conversion against his co-owner, when he had not submitted any evidence that the fox had been destroyed or sold. The plaintiff's attorney submitted that as the evidence showed that the defendant had stated to the plaintiff when he asked about the fox that he, the plaintiff had no interest whatever in it that it brought the case within the exception and that the action was properly taken. Judge Inman stated this point had never been raised in his Court before and he would take the matter under advisement till May 1st when he would give judgment on the point raised.
