MONTAGUE MINISTER GETS CALL.—Rev. C. Younger Lewis formerly minister of the Presbyterian church at Montague, P. E. I., has been appointed minister of the First Presbyterian church in this city for a period of one year, the appointment having been made by the Saint John presbytery at the request of the local congregation. The new minister commenced his duties yesterday and preached forceful and interesting sermons at both morning and evening services. Before coming to Moncton Rev. Mr. Lewis supplied the pulpit in the church at Montague for some time. Among his former congregations are the churches at Buctouche, N. B., and Valleyfield, Quebec. He has been heard in Moncton, having preached on several occasions some years ago in St. John's church. Rev. Mr. Lewis succeeds Rev. S. J. MacArthur, who at the last Presbyterian General Assembly was appointed missionary at large to the Presbyterian church in the Maritime provinces, with headquarters at Fredericton.—Moncton Transcript.

Will Superintend Agriculture In Newfoundland
AMHERST, N.S., Oct. 16.—(C.P.)—The task of organizing a Department of Agriculture for the Newfoundland Commission Government has fallen to A. B. Banks, for four years agricultural representative in Cumberland County. Mr. Banks tonight announced that he had accepted the appointment of the Island's first Director of Agriculture and would leave the end of October for St. John's. The appointment followed a survey of Newfoundland's agricultural possibilities by W. W. Baird, Director of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Nappan, N.S., who advised the Commission Government to institute a definite agricultural policy in keeping with the possibilities and funds available. If Mr. Baird's recommendations are carried out, Director Banks will have an assistant director, four or five permanent field service men and three or four part-time field service men. In his report, Mr. Baird suggested that the Director should receive about \$4,000 a year plus travelling expenses, and the assistant about \$3,000 plus travelling expenses. He stated that living conditions were 30 to 40 per cent higher in Newfoundland. Mr. Banks will be succeeded in Cumberland by D. E. McPhee, now agricultural representative in Antigonish County, who was assistant representative here two years ago.

Von Papen Sees Hostile Austria
VIENNA, Oct. 16.—(A.P.)—Franz Von Papen, German minister to Austria, left for Berlin today after having made complaints of numerous irritations since his arrival only 10 days ago. The German minister departed saying he wished to take formal leave from German officials and friends, but in Austrian quarters it was understood his purpose was to report to Chancellor Hitler concerning widespread hostility to Germany in Austria. Von Papen protested against the so-called "Brown Book" and against numerous newspaper attacks on Germany. The press assaults were regarded as significant because the Austrian government exercises a strict censorship over all publications. The last straw, it was stated, came when the government "organ of the Christian Corporate State" observed that any understanding between Austria and Germany could mean nothing more. Telephone girls in Tokio, Japan are learning to transact their business while wearing gas masks in order to be prepared to continue their work in an emergency.

Public Fooled On Insull Stock
CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—(A.P.)—The Insull "jewel box" contained only "paste" gems, the government contended today, when stock of corporation securities company was offered by Samuel Insull for sale to the public. Prosecutor Leslie E. Salter made this claim when Walter Dehner, salesman in the Cincinnati offices of Halsey Stuart and Co., testified that he was informed by his superiors that Corporation Securities Co. was an investment trust owning chiefly shares in the prosperous Insull Utility operating concerns. "Where did you get the idea that the company's investments were in operating companies?" asked Salter. "I think I know what was in the portfolio," said Dehner. "Seventy percent of its stock was in Commonwealth Edison Co., the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois, Peoples Gas Light and Coke Company and the Middle West Utilities Co., according to information given me." "You passed that along to customers," inquired Salter. "Yes." "Were you told," Salter demanded, "that the company didn't have a single share of stock in the operating companies?" "No." "Did your superiors tell you that all the company had was 300,000 shares of Insull Utility Investment Inc., a liability of \$6,500,000 and a contract to buy \$13,000,000 in Middle West Utilities stock?" "Dehner said he had not heard this version of the strength of the Corp."


Christmas Tree Buyer Arrives In Maritimes

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 16.—With the approach of the Christmas season United States buyers are arriving in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to make arrangements for the annual supply of Christmas trees, according to local officials of the Canadian National Railways. A recent arrival in New Brunswick is Mr. F. J. Lambert of Walter Gap, Pa., representing Donald L. Nixon of Thalsburg, Pa., one of the largest of the Christmas tree dealers in the United States. It is only reported that this year's cut will equal that of last year when 240 carloads of trees from New Brunswick went forward to delight the hearts of kiddies at Christmas time. These trees went all the way to Wisconsin, Chicago, Ill., and St. Louis, Mo., as well as to the eastern states.

Gandhi Relinquishes Leadership
