W. A. Stewart, merchant tailor, returned yesterday from a business trip to Boston, New York and other American cities.

A meeting of the people of Bedouque and vicinity who are interested in the Bedouque ferry will be held at Centreville Hall on Wednesday Feb. 4th, at 2 p.m. Local representatives will be present. The matter of a steamer for Bedouque, Summerside, and other ports will be discussed and it is hoped that the meeting will be largely attended.

Miss Carrie McDonald professional nurse, sister of Dr. James and A. R. McDonald of this town, arrived home from Boston on the 28th inst. Miss McDonald's unexpected visit at this time of the year was necessitated by the very serious illness of her sister, Mrs. J. Devereaux of Kelly's Cross. We are pleased to learn that Mrs. Devereaux is improving.

THE Stanley with the force of the tide and easterly wind drifted up the Straits all day yesterday. Early in the morning Milton Walsh and others drove from Hampton taking an ice boat and a quantity of dynamite and boarded the steamer southwest of Victoria. During the day the dynamiters were at work and made several blasts with some effect. The steamer at 3 p. m. was off Bell's Head. In response to the signals on the steamer a boat went out from Cape Traverse with ten men under command of Thos. Howatt and including representatives of the Pioneer and Guardian. They reached the steamer about 4.30 p. m. and returned with a message from Mr. Walsh ordering another quantity of dynamite. The steamer was last evening about due south of Cape Traverse wharf about three miles from the shore. Apart from the heavy fields of ice in which the boat is held the strait is clear of ice in a westerly direction.

In church work Mr. Forsythe took an active part, he was elder in the Presbyterian church for 12 years and was also a teacher in Sabbath School. His death will be a great loss to his friends and the church. The funeral which was largely attended took place yesterday afternoon to the Presbyterian church where the services were conducted by Rev. H. G. Gatz, assisted by Rev. A. D. McDonald, thence to the Presbyterian Cemetery. The bereaved have the sympathy of all.
