JAPANESE TO TAKE ACTION IN SIBERIA SOON

HARBIN, Feb. 26.—(By Associated Press)—The Japanese, according to reliable authority intend to take action in Siberia at an early date, and there are evidences that the Japanese have long been preparing to carry out this move.

The situation in Siberia is considered extremely grave, owing to the inability of the Cossack General Semenov, head of the anti-Bolshevik movement in that vast territory to secure allied support, for which he has appealed to the Japanese. General Semenov's movement is now officially recognized, and a general committee has been formed at Harbin, which will act as a general staff, divided into three departments: financial, military and administrative. The Russian Consul, M. Popoff has been appointed chairman of the committee.

Two thousand Germans have been armed and are drilling at Irkutsk, capital of the Government of Irkutsk in Eastern Siberia, and, according to an official report received from a foreign consul, the Germans are making all preparations to bring much larger forces there.
