## BROCKVILLE TO GET G. T. R. ENGINE SHOPS

BROCKVILLE, March 14.—For several years past rumors have cropped up from time to time concerning the intention of the Grand Trunk Railway to construct new engine shops at Manitoba siding, the freight yards of the company at the west end of the town, but nothing of a definite character has so far materialized beyond the drawing up of plans which are known to be in existence. The removal of the shops from the present site west of William Street, would most likely be followed by the erection of a new depot and the changing of the location of the freight sheds which would remove the danger attendant the William Street crossing now before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

It looks just now as if there would be something doing in the near future. Superintendent Whitenberger and Assistant Superintendent Coyle arrived in Brockville from the east at noon yesterday and during the afternoon they were joined by Vice-President Fitzhugh and General Transportation Manager Brownlee. The quartette spent considerable time at Manitoba Siding looking over the ground and studying blue prints. It is stated on good authority that the object of their visit was in connection with the proposal to make an early start on the erection of the new engine shops which will be quite extensive along modern lines. It is also the intention, so it is said, to remove the present coal chutes at the eastern entrance to the yards, to the north side of the tracks. This would involve another large expenditure and give employment to a big force of men. The building outlook in Brockville promises well this summer.

## C. P. R. NOT GOING TO LEAVE LIVERPOOL

LONDON, March 14.—A rumor is heard that the C. P. R. Express steamers may use Fishguard, Wales, as their terminal on this side of the ocean. Another rumor has it that the C. P. R. intend building two additional steamers of greater size and speed than the Empresses.

From inquiries at the Canadian Pacific headquarters today the report that there was any likelihood of the company changing its English terminal port from Liverpool to Fishguard was denied.

While the company admitted that Fishguard had certain advantages in point of speed, as compared with the Lancashire port, it was pointed out that it had inconveniences also.

Officials here are under the impression that the cable correspondent is in error in ascribing the intention of leaving Liverpool to the C. P. R., although it is considered probable that Fishguard has been selected as a port of call for the Heliopolis and Cairo the new steamers recently purchased for the Canadian Northern.

The C. P. R. again disavowed any intention of building faster or larger steamships for the Atlantic service than they have at present.

## WILL BE A CHECK ON BRITAIN WAGING AN UNPOPULAR WAR.

LONDON, March 13.—The Morning Post, discussing the naval decision at Ottawa, says the reservation of control over the fleet in war time is vital to the conception of national autonomy and thinks it unlikely to embarrass Britain's foreign policy.

The Post adds that the likelihood of Britain allowing herself to incur an unpopular war is diminished by the necessity of carrying the opinion of the dominions with her.

There are 400 Barnardo children on board the Allan liner Tunisian which sailed on Thursday for St. John.

A large per centage of the emigrants sailing in March and April are going to Ontario.

Among the passengers on the S. S. Empress of Ireland sailing today for St. John is H. D. Annable, who for the past nine years has ably filled a very high position in the London offices of the C. P. R. A large number of personal friends assembled at Euston station to wish him bon voyage.

President Hays, speaking after the launch of the Grand Trunk Pacific steamer Prince George, at Walsend, said faster boats and of greater tonnage between here and Canada must undoubtedly come. They would be the result of the demand for grain from this side.

Baden Powell is raising two patrols of boy scouts for a trip to Canada.

In the Commons today Sir Edward Grey said that emigration of reservists could be permitted only to a limited extent. The army council would be glad if employment with the overseas dominion forces could be guaranteed for a limited period, say for two years, for soldiers whose time of service at home had expired.

## THE HORSES AND CARRIAGE SEIZED.

COATICOOK, Que., March 13.—The last of a series of events in connection with a seizure made by the Customs officers of Coaticook took place here this week. It was the sale of an express wagon, harness and a lot of cream cans. It is nearly two years since the Customs officers seized a pair of horses and the property above mentioned, the cans then being filled with cream. It appears that cream was being brought into Canada to a creamery here without any duty being paid. Hence the seizure. The horses and the cream were sold by the Government. They kept the greater part of the proceeds themselves and deposited the remainder in the bank to the credit of G. E. Hetu who was supposed to own the team and cream. The effects, when seized were put in the possession of B. D. Crane. A year ago Hetu was notified that the wagon, harness and cans were at Crane's, and that he could have them upon demand. He has never taken them and now the charges for storage were equal to the value of the property. This week the effects were sold at public auction in order to pay Crane's cost for storage. The only thing left from the property is the \$38 deposited.

"To be or not to be" appears to be a question in the minds of rate-payers, that is, whether there is to be or not to be a poll held on the \$122,000 loan by-law recently passed by the Council. It will be submitted for the approval of the electors on Saturday. Whether six electors will demand a poll or not is a question. The Citizens' League will hold a meeting Friday evening, and it is possible the result of the deliberations on that occasion will have something to do towards deciding the matter.

The school trustees have engaged a principal and model teacher for the Academy in place of Principal Hunter and Miss Buck, resigned. The new principal is L. More, of Danville. The new Model teacher is Miss B. E. Smith, of the same place.

A SAD SUICIDE IN FREDERICTON, N. B. FREDERICTON, March 15.—George Albert Russ, an employee of the Hartt Shoe Co., shot and killed himself last night in his room at Long's Hotel.

## ONE DEAD AND TWO BUILDING COLLAPSE.

WINNIPEG, March 14.—The top floor of the new Union Station in Winnipeg collapsed Saturday afternoon and three workmen fell two stories with a mass of brick, concrete and debris.

An Italian named Sam Spoverio was killed and A. Barrett, Charles Schultz and John Boyle were badly hurt. It is feared that the two latter may die.

## MINISTER STRICKEN DEAD.

OLD ORCHARD, Me., March 14.—While preparing to go to church this morning, Rev. J. L. Lapham, a retired Methodist clergyman, who had held important posts in many Maine towns and cities, was stricken with heart disease and died almost instantly. Mr. Lapham, who was seventy-eight years old, remained in active service until 1906, when he completed forty-five years' work in the ministry.
