PATRIOTIC FUND RELIEF COMMITTEE CHAIRMANSHIP.—Acting on doctor's orders, the Hon. Justice R. Fitzgerald has resigned the chairmanship of the Relief Committee of the Patriotic Fund. SAIL TODAY.—A cablegram to Mr. J. T. McKenzie, from his son, Sergt. Cuyler McKenzie, of No. 8 Siege Battery (The Happy Fifth) dated at London, and received yesterday morning, stated that the Battery was leaving for France today, Saturday. This means that the Happy 8th is leaving Woolwich Camp, today for France, to take part in the battles on the western front. All will be interested in this news and no doubt this gallant Battery, like the 98th, or the 2nd Siege Battery, which preceded them to the front some time ago will give a splendid account of themselves. The Happy 8th has already won great honor in the Camp at Woolwich, and it is not too much to expect that they will distinguish themselves and win greater glory on the battlefields of France. It is with pride and regret that we note the going forth to war of our gallant boys. They and those who preceded them have done their duty, made a great sacrifice, and their loyalty, courage and appreciation of what they owe to the Empire, is greatly admired by all.

BUTTER MAKERS COURSE.—The course of instruction for Maritime buttermakers which was concluded at Truro Agricultural College a few days ago was well attended by men from this Province. Those attending (with their present location) were as follows: H. J. McDonald, Annandale, (Ree House Factory); E. D. Sherren, Crapaud (Crapaud Creamery); D. A. Weatherly, Lake Verde (Hazelbrook Factory); C. M. Johnson, Central Bedouque (Dunk River Creamery); Mac Boulter, Crapaud, (Crapaud Creamery); Percy Simons, Dunstaffnage, (Dunstaffnage Creamery). During the full two weeks the men were given a course of lectures which included butter-making, milk testing, care of milk, cream separators, chemistry, bacteriology, feeding for milk production and other allied subjects. All who attended bear testimony to the value of the course in the highest terms of praise. Such will apply especially to the method of manufacture which was used in buttermaking. In this quality and uniformity were principal points to be kept in view. By such a method in the market for the Island product going to be assured in the future. The meeting of the makers will be followed by a greater provincial uniformity of ideas and the resulting product will be one that will do credit to the Island and to the broadminded men who have seen fit to take instructions from teachers of Dominion repute.
