

SUFFRAGETTE WANT'S TO SEE TAFT

WASHINGTON, November 23—Mrs. Philip Snowden, wife of a liberal member of the British parliament and a noted suffragette, tried to see President Taft yesterday. Protesting that she does not belong to the militant branch of the organization, which has made the lives of British statesmen miserable for the past few months, Mrs. Snowden left the White House, announcing that she would endeavor today again to run the gauntlet that shut her off from the chief executive of the United States.

"I am desirous of meeting President Taft," she said, "because I met your former president, Mr. Roosevelt, and found him to be most charming. I am anxious, therefore, to have the privilege of knowing his successor."

BOSTON CANADIANS AT ANNUAL DINNER

BOSTON, Nov. 23—"Canada is building warships to protect her frontiers and to help out the Mother Country who in the past years has done so much for Canada," declared W. O. Sealey, member of the Canadian House of Commons, speaking before the annual banquet at the Parker House last night. The greater part of his address was devoted to the great resources of Canada, and as to how they would be affected by the Payne-Albright Bill.

Dr. N. Patzer, President of the Canadian Club of New York, followed with a discussion of the reciprocity measures which Canadians in the United States wished consummated. Other speakers on reciprocity were Colonel Sidney O. Bigney, of Attleboro, Chas. S. Hamlin, of Nattapottett, Former Secretary of the Navy and Henry M. Whitney.

WRIGHTS' COMPANY DIRECTORATE NAMED

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 23—Capitalized at one million dollars the Wright Company of New York, was incorporated yesterday, to manufacture, sell, deal in, operate and otherwise use at any place or places on the North American Continent and the islands adjacent thereto, machines, ships or other mechanical contrivances for aerial operation or navigation of any kind and every kind and description, and any future improvements or developments of the same.

The directors are Wilbur Wright, Orville Wright, of Dayton, Ohio; Geo. A. Stevens, H. S. Hooker and Alpheus F. Barnes, of New York.

NEW POSTAL CARDS FOR U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23—Designs for the new postal cards have been approved by Postmaster-General Hitchcock. On the ordinary card the head of the late President McKinley will appear, as now, but a much better likeness has been selected.

On the new small card, intended for index purposes and for social correspondence, a likeness of President Lincoln will appear. The two-cent international card will bear a portrait of Gen. Grant.

On the reply card will appear a portrait of George Washington on one half and a likeness of Martha Washington on the second part.

PANAMA CANAL FIVE MILES OPEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24—Five miles of Panama Canal have been opened to navigation—from Panama to Balboa. Steamships are using this part of the canal daily.

WARRENTON UNDER MARTIAL LAW

WARRENTON, Va., Nov. 23—Following a fire which threatened to wipe out the town, Warrenton, is under martial law and four blocks of buildings in the heart of the town are smoking ruins. Only by the use of dynamite was the town saved from complete destruction for the drought of seven weeks, which has prevailed in this section had completely exhausted the water supply, and the water for drinking had to be shipped here. The dynamiting of the four buildings checked the flames, which finally burned out. The damage is reported last night, despite the extent of the conflagration, to be but sixty-five thousand dollars or seventy-five thousand dollars, with insurance of about fifty thousand dollars. Many wealthy Englishmen have fine estates here, as have several Washington and New York society people.

GOVERNMENT LANDS MAKE HIGH PRICES

VANCOUVER, Nov. 23—Selling for thousands of dollars per acre, where five, three quarters of a million dollars ago figures were in hundreds worth of property have been disposed of at the Government auction and a likeness of Martha Washington on the second part.

Another million dollars worth is expected to go at once, and another half million before long, according to an estimate by Trites and Leslie, the vendors for the Government. A great proportion of the Government lands went to Winnipeg people, and residents of Saskatchewan and Alberta, who made their purchases through brokers. Five years ago prices ranging from two to five hundred dollars an acre were paid. Today a single acre sold as high as \$5,250. The Government still has 1,300 acres in the district, which is estimated to be worth more than enough to pay off the total bonded indebtedness of the Province of British Columbia.

PLYMOUTH, Nov. 24.—The new dreadnought "Vanguard," completed an eight hour trial trip here, during which she attained the remarkable speed of 22.0 knots—a full knot in excess of the Admiralty's stipulation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23—Mrs. Anna Kessler was found murdered in the dining room of her apartment, at No. 319 East 121st street and after a hurried investigation of the mystery the police sent out a general alarm for John Neuman, who had boarded with her.

The woman was strangled and stabbed and a fracture of the skull was inflicted by blows with a hammer. Robbery was the motive, for her diamond earrings had been torn from her ears and rings had been forcibly removed from her fingers. The victim was twenty-eight years old and exceptionally pretty.

The discovery of the murder was made by Mrs. Kessler's sister, Mrs. Sigmund Altman, who lives on the ground floor of the building. Mrs. Kessler had been feeling ill, and when she did not make her usual morning call on her sister Mrs. Adams went up stairs to investigate. She found the apartment locked, and becoming alarmed, called Louis Klein, who keeps a store on the ground floor.
