Dunn of the 3rd Bn. C.M.G.C., who has just returned from the front. The chair was ably occupied by Mr. P. J. D. Edmunds. In a few well chosen remarks Mr. Edmunds explained how pleased they all were to see Eugen with them again after an absence of over three years. He also paid fitting tribute to the boys immortal deed, "Over There" and regretted very much that some had to pay the extreme penalty for Humanity's greatest cause. A very fitting address was then read by Mr. J. F. McMillan teacher of Sun merville at the end of which, Miss Margaret Power, in behalf of the company presented Cpl. Dunn with a valuable gift—a twenty dollar gold piece and a neat gold chain. Following is the address:— To Cpl. Eugene J. Dunn, Sunmerville. Dear Friend:— It affords us, your old friends neighbors and school mates genuine pleasure to assemble here tonight to welcome your return from the blood stained fields of Flanders. It was with feelings of pride yet tinged with sorrow that we saw you part from us three years ago. "Pride that you had heard and voluntarily responded to your country's call in the cause of Freedom and Righteousness, "Sorrow" that you might never return. But to night that sorrow is replaced by the joy that fortunately you have escaped without a scar. We have known you from childhood and we are confident that the splendid brave and manly qualities kept and cherished by you would enable you to perform whatever duty required of you during the last three years in the different phases of soldier life in a gallant and heroic manner and we have not leniency of the last three years will all ways be a source of pride when you realize that you have participated in the greatest war that was ever known. Now as brevity is the best mode of expression and we do not wish to embarrass you with flattering remarks we will conclude by asking you to accept the accompanying gift as a small token of remembrance and with the very

best wishes of your many friends in Sunmerville. Corporal Dunn fittingly replied thanking his friends for their personal interest in him for their very handsome gift and their excellent address. He remarked how proud all the boys were to get back to "God's Country" after their trying experiences. He also paid a glowing tribute to the kindness of the people of P.E.I. to their boys overseas where real socks and other comforts were always in evidence. Three cheers were then given or the returned hero and then all repaired to the dining room where a laity tea was served by the ladies of Sunmerville. The remainder of the evening was spent in music and dancing and at the close all went away well pleased with the good time spent and wishing Cpl. Dunn every success.

Coady with a splendid circular leather toilet case fully equipped with Ebony brushes and other necessaries. Sgt. Coady replied in a happy manner thanking the friends for their gifts and expressions of good will and also for remembering him at various times when he was away "over there." The ladies then served a dainty and bountiful luncheon and toward the "wee small hours," the company dispersed after singing "God Save the King." The address was as follows:— To Sgt Alfred L. Coady, Dear friend:—We are glad to have this opportunity of meeting together tonight to welcome you back to home and friends and to congratulate you that notwithstanding the hardships you have endured and the dangers through which you have passed—you are still physically fit. For this we cannot but give thanks to "The God of our far flung battle line," that he has watched over you and protected you through all these troublous years. We remember that at first you enlisted and did coast guard service at Canso, but heeding the call to greater service you went to France and became part of that living wall that stood between us and the power of the dastardly and cruel Hun. In charge of an ammunition column you had abundant opportunity to display those qualities of courage and initiative that have so characterized our brave Canadian boys: For the history of the war will tell us that our Canadian troops have formed the spear-head of almost every successful attack on the Western front. The energy, bravery and devotion to duty of the ammunition carriers was no small factor in bringing about a glorious victory. We trust that the negotiations now in progress at the great peace conference may bring in a golden age where "nation shall not rise up against nation neither will they learn war any more." We wish for you that health and happiness might attend you for we feel that if you display the same energy in business that you have in war—like pursuit that prosperity cannot but perch on your banners. We would now ask you to accept this little memento that as you use the different articles you may be reminded of our interest in you and our wishes for your general welfare.
