THE MAYOR INDIGNANT.

Mayor Warburton was waited upon yesterday by a GUARDIAN representative with a view to ascertain his intentions as to the dismissal of Mr. Angus McDonald from the chairmanship of the Police Committee. This was quite in the usual course of newspaper work. None the less the Mayor was highly indignant. He declined to be formally interviewed. He also expressed his opinion that THE GUARDIAN is pursuing an idiotic course, and made unkindly references to the editor of this journal which need not be here recorded. He frankly admitted that he had the power to dismiss the Police Chairman, but had no intention of doing so, and expressed the opinion that Councillor McDonald is the best Councillor we have.

All of which is so much light from behind the scenes. And from which it appears that Councillor McDonald, twice convicted and fined for violating the Prohibitory Law and previously convicted and fined for violating the Canada Temperance Act, is a Councillor after Mayor Warburton's own heart. It is well that our orderly, temperate and law abiding citizens, who helped elect the Mayor, should know these things. It is well also that the other members of the Council, Board, who have not broken the law, and have not been convicted, and not fined should know that in the expressed opinion and statement of the Mayor there is another and better Councillor than they or any of them are, to wit, Councillor Angus McDonald.

It is well that city pastors, the churches and the temperance societies should know that the Mayor of the City holds and expresses the opinion that a convicted rum-seller is today our best City Councillor. We will not at present give our opinion of the Mayor. We are content that he shall be judged out of his own mouth.

FIRST WOMAN PREACHER.

BIG COAL COMBINE.

NEW YORK, August 3.—The Mail and Express says it was learned today that an underwriting syndicate of possibly \$50,000,000 had been formed to finance the consolidation of the bituminous coal properties along the Norfolk and Western, Chesapeake and Ohio and possibly also the Hocking Valley, Baltimore, and Ohio and other railroads in West Virginia, western Pennsylvania and Ohio.

DRIVEN OUT OF TOWN.

ZANEVILLE, August 5.—Twenty-five Italian brick-makers were driven out of the town of Roseville Sunday night by striking workmen. Bottles, clubs, bricks and other weapons were used and many persons were injured.

CARNEGIE LIBRARIES.

In response to requests from the mayors of various Canadian cities Mr. Carnegie has made offers of handsome amounts to establish public libraries in leading centres from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The list, subject to future additions, now stands about as follows:

- Montreal, \$150,000.
- Ottawa, \$100,000.
- Winnipeg, \$100,000.
- Halifax, \$50,000.
- Vancouver, \$50,000.
- Sydney, \$25,000.
- Collingwood, \$25,000.
- Windsor, \$25,000.

In each case, as we understand it, Mr. Carnegie's generous offer is coupled with a stipulation that the city which becomes his beneficiary shall make provision for the subsequent perpetual maintenance of the library he endows to an amount yearly equal to one-tenth of the sum first donated. That is to say, if Mr. Carnegie gives \$100,000, the city receiving the same shall provide a yearly grant of \$10,000 for maintenance; if Mr. Carnegie donates \$25,000 the beneficiary city must provide \$2,500, and so on in proportion where he bestows larger or smaller sums. This fact has an important bearing on our own case here in Charlottetown. It is altogether probable that Mr. Carnegie would assist us, if desired to do so, toward creating a public library here. It is most improbable that he would assist except on the conditions he has laid down.

Not all the cities which have received offers of Mr. Carnegie's generous aid are quite willing to comply with the conditions as to maintenance. But so far we have not noticed that any fault has been found with Mr. Carnegie on account of the stipulation referred to. It is indeed a most reasonable one. It would be quite absurd for Mr. Carnegie to endow a public library in a city that had not public spirit enough to maintain it. It would be quite useless to create a library, either by the generosity of one man, or by the spasmodic effort of many and then permit it to fall of its legitimate object for want of financial support. Mr. Carnegie's plan seems well-devised and will likely be productive of great good in those cities throughout the English-speaking world that may avail themselves of his more than princely generosity.
