LAW ENFORCEMENT

The enforcement of law depends upon two factors, namely, the righteousness of the law and a recognition of the moral obligation devolving upon the people to obey the law.

In this country of ours and in this age of our history unjust and unreasonable laws are rare. We have, thank God, no laws, provincial, civic or social, that were not enacted for the common good.

How are we to enforce those laws which stand across the path and bar the sweet wills of some of our citizens? How enforce laws to which certain classes of citizens object? This can be accomplished only by education and example.

Once convinced that the law in question is for the greatest good to the greatest number, even should it interfere with our own personal liberty, our duty is clear, we must obey it and, by our example, make it easier for others to do so.

The greatest hindrance to the enforcement of law is criticism of that law which affects ourselves personally. Such criticism becomes epidemic, contempt of and disregard for all law are engendered, and we are only a step from becoming a nation of law breakers.

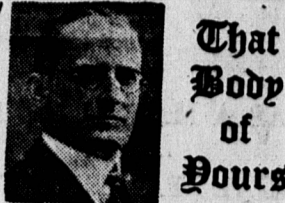
Let any reader of these lines try to imagine if he can a Tory wall ascending to the skies because the shattered wreck of a mongrel Government to which all Tories were opposed is now lying confounded on the burning mar of popular indignation. Just think of it, the victorious host who follow Mr. Meighen wailing because their political enemies have been so defeated and routed that after three months only one of their number has ventured to face the people and he pitiously whining because another candidate has taken the field against him.

"A nameless thing, so abject yet alive"—if it can be still numbered among living things—fitly describes the mangled remains of what was once the King Government. It never really existed except on sufferance, a sickly incapable thing that was supported by Progressive props and tolerated by a patient people only until they could get a chance to abate the nuisance. In one October day the props were knocked aside and the frail thing toppled down under the stroke of an indignant people. The one decent thing that could have been done to save it to the semblance of honor in its fall was to submit to the verdict of the people, and that the dying wreck refused. And it is written that "when faith is lost when honor dies, the man is dead."

Appealing to the House of Commons against its defeat at the polls, the dying fragment of a government has been upheld, first by three votes, next by ten and lastly by the solitary vote of one man. And its chief organ in this Province would have its readers believe that in face of such conditions the Opposition is wailing. Perhaps also the remains of the motley party in power are rejoicing over their handsome majority of one.

What do the people of our own City and Province think of the situation at Ottawa? That is a matter of some importance just now. In those close divisions with majorities of three and one, the votes of the two government supporters from Queens and Prince counties counted for something. They counted to prolong for a brief space the misrule of the past four years, and so defeat the will of the majority in the Maritimes and throughout Canada.

There is always the conflict between physicians as to the wisdom of getting sick people on their feet after an acute illness. One quite properly suggests that when the acute illness is past, the patient only becomes weak by remaining in bed. That if you can get him roused up, get him to walk about the room with the windows open, you'll create a genuine appetite, and he'll soon be all right again.

The other points out that to make him get up before he is ready, is to take a chance on causing a relapse, as his heart will not be at full strength, and he will overtax it.

In some parts of Europe, patients recovering from acute illness or from operations, are taken outdoors and given some graded exercises, so as to build them up before they return to their homes.

However a new instrument is now in the hands of physicians which makes it possible to decide on this question of just when to get the patient up on his feet.

This machine registers the amount of work the body is actually doing when it is at complete rest, and no food is being digested. There is what is known as the normal amount of work for a body of a certain size and weight. If it is doing more than this, while at rest, something is wrong in the body, and the body processes are working a little harder to keep up with the trouble that is going on.

If the body is doing less work than normal, then the strength should be conserved until his body processes are able to do the normal amount of work. This means that the individual should remain quietly in bed until this time.

Not only so happens that some bodies will return to their normal working in two days, whereas others will be two weeks in doing so, after the same kind of illness.

You can readily see that an instrument of this kind is not only going to save time in many cases where the physician might be over careful, and also prevent any relapse where the physician might want to get the patient on his feet too soon. They will wait until it is doing its "normal" work.

There really will not be any chance for much difference of opinion once these machines come into general use.

THE DRAMA AT OTTAWA SEEN THROUGH ISLAND EYES

Ottawa, Monday, Feb. 1st. I have already said something about Ottawa's magnificent public library. In addition to the largely stocked lending library it has a fine reading room, large newspaper room, a reference department, lecture room, childrens department in a separate building adjoining, and several branch libraries in outlying parts of the city.

On one of the tables I noticed an attractive publication entitled "Eastern Canada" issued by the Department of the Interior last year. There was with it a similar publication entitled "Canada West." The "Eastern Canada" booklet contains some pages of general descriptive matter and a good deal of instruction for intending immigrants, maps of each of the Provinces and numerous illustrations. In addition there is descriptive matter relative particularly to each province, two pages being given up to Prince Edward Island, four pages each to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, five pages to Quebec and six to Ontario.

The peculiar opportunities afforded by "Prince Edward Island are mainly for the small farmer producing potatoes and vegetables as his chief crops. Twenty or twenty-five acres well farmed will give a good living. Apples and small fruits are grown successfully but usually on a commercial scale. The twenty-five acre farm would be devoted mainly to potatoes but in addition other vegetables such as turnips, beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, cabbages, etc. would be grown. The settler on such a farm producing these crops, also raising a few pigs and some poultry, is assured of a living as certain and as comfortable as can be produced from the land in any country.

I don't know who it was who prepared this matter about Prince Edward Island. Of course, there is other descriptive matter in reference to dairying, stock raising, climate, social conditions, transportation, etc.
