SPEAKERS AT BOSTON SCORE GAMBLING

BOSTON, May 12—"The ethical aspects of gambling," the topic discussed at the night session of the National Episcopal Congress in Tremont Temple, was apparently the most interesting of any subject which has yet been taken up. Rev. St. Clair Hester, of New York, was especially outspoken on the subject and during his address he referred to the efforts which had been made in his own state to suppress betting on horse races. He thought that it would be no great exaggeration to say that the whole commercial life of our times is infected with its taint.

Another speaker, Seneca S. Pratt, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of the state of New York, who scathingly arraigned gambling in its various forms and the necessities of life. The subject of gambling was also discussed by Rev. Flavel S. Luther, L.L.D., president of Trinity College, Hartford, (Conn.), and Dr. T. E. J. Woodbridge, professor of philosophy in Columbia University.

BRITISH SUFFRAGETTES BOMBARD PARLIAMENT

LONDON, May 12—Shut out of the house of commons by the police specially selected to circumvent their ingenuity, the suffragettes yesterday found a new method of getting literature into the hands of the nation's legislators. Chartering a fine steam launch, which they aggressively labeled "Dreadnought," and putting a band on board, a party of women steamed up the river this afternoon until they reached a point opposite the houses of parliament. Here the boat stopped and the women attracted the attention of the members on the terraces by singing the Marseillaise. When suddenly there was fired from the launch a broadside of rockets, and a regular snow storm of hand bills fluttered down over the watching embers.

ACCLAIMED IN LONDON

LONDON, May 12—Edmond Burke, the Canadian baritone, whose singing at the Royal Opera, the Hague, has created much interest in musical circles during the last year, received an ovation yesterday when he appeared at Alys Bateman's recital, in Aeolian Hall. On May 24th Mr. Burke sings at Queen's Hall, with Patti, Santly and Murial Foster.

ROOSEVELT SHOTS BULL RHINOCEROS

NAIROBI, British East Africa, May 12—A bulky bull rhinoceros is the latest prize wrested from the jungle by Theodore Roosevelt. From his camp near Machakos word was brought down yesterday that the luck of the Roosevelt party continues and that five varieties of game, including the big rhino, have been bagged on the last expedition.

The rhinoceros was charging Mr. Roosevelt when the hunter fired. The distance was 14 paces and the animal fell dead.

The naturalists of the party are kept busy preparing the trophies which Mr. Roosevelt and his son Kermit are bringing in daily. Forty-five skins already have been prepared for the Smithsonian institute in Washington.

Although it was reported more than a week ago that the Roosevelt party was cut particularly for giraffes, the reports from East Africa have made no mention of any success in the search. Giraffes are more scarce than any other variety of the larger game there. It is very difficult, too, to ride them down unless they find themselves hard pressed or are caught by surprise. Only one giraffe was killed in the Athi district, where Mr. Roosevelt now is, and only 11 were killed in the entire protectorate, during the season of 1906-07. On the other hand the rhinos are comparatively plentiful. About 150 were killed during the 1907 season.

In addition to the giraffe, Mr. Roosevelt has yet to get a hippopotamus and an elephant. Of the latter there are none in the region where he is now hunting, but it is believed he will meet with a hippo before he quits the Athi valley, for they are comparatively plentiful there. About 150 of them were killed in the protectorate in the 1906-07 season.

It is expected that within a few days, probably on Saturday, the Roosevelt caravan will move on to the Setik district which lies 50 or 60 miles to the northwest of Nairobi and near lake Victoria.

A MAN DROWNED AT PLASTER ROCK

PLASTER ROCK, May 13—An Italian was drowned below here yesterday. He had taken some men across the river in a boat and was returning when the boat suddenly overturned and he went down. The body has not been recovered.

GERALDINE FARRAR TO MARY SCOTT

NEW YORK, May 12—Miss Geraldine Farrar, the American prima donna of the Metropolitan Opera House and Signor Antonio Scotti, the Italian baritone of the same company, who sailed for Europe this week, are to be married in Paris within a month, according to a story published here tonight based on wireless messages said to have been received here from Miss Farrar by friends today. The marriage is to take place, it is added, at the Church of the Madeleine in Paris.

DISASTROUS SPRING FRESHET

VANBUREN, Me., May 13.—A belated spring freshet swelled the waters of the St. John river six inches in an hour and the water is still rising. The principal damage was the carrying away of the suspension bridge across the river between Fort Kent and Clair. Two houses were drowned and the wharfage fitting was drawn on with the flow of water.

HAMILTON MYSTERY MAY BE CLEARED

HAMILTON, Ont., May 12—Edward Hughes, the young man, accused of assaulting Henry Buswell, on New Year's Day, has given himself up to the police. The assault took place early on the morning of January 1 last. Buswell, together with his wife and a party of friends, were returning home, when one of a gang of young men standing on the sidewalk made an insulting remark to Mrs. Buswell. Mr. Buswell resented this, and went back to protest. The gang waited until he got up to them, and then he received a fearful blow, the sting more was seen of them. Mr. Buswell took to their heels, and nothing in town for a short time left to well finally recovered, and after staying a position out of town. Before leaving the warrant had been made out for Hughes.

Some weeks ago, one of the city detectives is alleged to have gone to the residence of Mrs. Buswell, who remained in Hamilton, and, she says, offered her \$1000 to drop the case against Hughes, who was in New York at the time. Mrs. Buswell wrote to her husband, but he instructed her to refuse the offer, which Mrs. Buswell did the next time the officer called. An investigation was held, the result of which was never given out.

KILLED BY DYNAMITE

ALBANY, May 13.—At least 20 men were killed by a premature blast of dynamite in the Stone Quarry operated by Callahan Co., near Bethlehem. At first it was believed that the death toll would reach 30, but several Italian workmen reported missing were accounted for.

STRAET CAR HELD UP BY MASKED ROBBER

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 12—A street car was held up by a masked robber early yesterday at the entrance of Washington park. He procured \$30. A shot was fired at him, but he escaped. He is supposed to be the man who perpetrated two similar robberies recently, in one wounding the conductor, who resisted.
