On rising to start the day's work Mr. Yes went to the barn and found it a mass of flames. He was able to drive the live stock to safety. Aid soon arrived and willing hands confined the fire which is of unknown origin, to the one building. Its contents of hay and seed were destroyed. The loss amounts to between \$500 and \$600. There is no insurance.

Scouts to Check Up on Path of Eclipse

Plans are being worked out for the co-operation of Scouts and McGill scientists in checking up on the path of the sun's eclipse across Quebec on August 31, Montreal and St. John's Scouts will establish the western edge of the path, and Scouts of Sherbrooke, Three Rivers and Quebec City the eastern edge of "totality." In preparation Montreal Scouts will attend a lecture on the subject by Dr. A. V. Douglas of McGill University.

New Camp For Alberta Boys

Announcement has been made of the gift to the Boy Scouts Association of Alberta of a splendid 125-acre camp site on Sylvan Lake as a permanent provincial camp. The donor is the Provincial Commissioner, Hon. Col. J. H. Woods of Calgary.

Russian Exile Scouts

One of the world's interesting groups of Scouts comprise "Russian Scouts in Foreign Countries"—boys of Russian exile. Units are located in thirteen countries, and at the last census numbered 1,301. Their Chief Scout is Oleg Pantuckoff, who resides in the United States.

THE LATE MR. FRED TURNBULL

The death occurred in Seattle, Wash., on Monday, April 18th, after a long illness, of Mr. Fred Turnbull, former section foreman for the Northern Pacific Railway at Skykomish for many years. He died at the family residence 1218 Terry Avenue, at the age of 71 years.

Mr. Turnbull was born in Halifax N. S., and came to the United States in 1881. He came to King's County from Boston in 1890, worked as a m'ner in Alaska, then settled in Skykomish where he lived for 27 years until two years ago when his health broke down.
