PASTORAL LETTER

The Following is the Continuance of the Lenten Letter.

The remainder of His Lordship Bishop O'Leary's Pastoral letter was read in the Cathedral yesterday as follows:

3rd Cheating.—Saint Paul condemns this practice very openly when he says, "That no man overreach or circumvent his brother in business because the Lord is the avenger of all such things." (1 Thess. 4, 6). The most common forms of cheating are found in buying and selling. In buying we find, (1) passing bad money for good or in payment for articles received; (2) forging signatures to documents, cheques, deeds, wills, etc.; (3) depreciating or degrading goods unfairly in order to buy them under their real value; (4) paying for less than has been received; (5) knowingly accepting too much change.

In selling we have (1) using false weights and measures, specifically condemned by Holy Writ. "Do not any unjust thing in weight or in measure." (Lev. 19, 35). "Let the balance be just and the weights equal." (Lev. 19, 36). "A deceitful balance is an abomination before the Lord." (Prov. 11, 1); (2) adulteration of goods, as mixing sand in sugar, water in milk, etc.; (3) passing off bad goods as sound or as much better than they are;—"Woe to you that call evil good and good evil.... that part bitter for sweets and sweet for bitter." (Isa. 5, 20); (4) giving wrong change knowingly; (5) charging for more than is sold, or done in case of work; (6) sending in bills already paid.

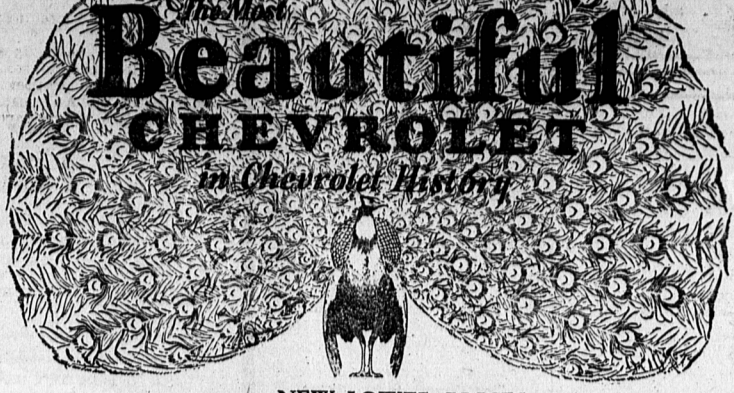
4th Usury.—By usury is meant charging exorbitant interest for a loan or obtaining something directly from a loan without legitimate reason, and may be regarded as robbery if done openly or as theft if hidden and not manifest. It is forbidden to take interests directly for a loan in itself or may be other just cause whatever outside the mere loan. This is forbidden by natural law which, commanding us to do to others as we would wish others to do to us, forbids lending for a reward because of the loan itself; by divine positive law, as we find in many places in Holy Scripture, "Take not usury of time nor more than thou gavest, fear they God that they cheat or may live with thee. Thou shalt not give thy money with usury nor exact of him any increase of fruits." (Lev. 25, 6, 52-53); by the law of the Church as shown by the decrees of the different Councils,—(the second Council of Lyons excommunicates usurers)—and many decisions of the Roman Congregations. No interest, therefore, can be asked in justice for the loan itself, but just reasons may be connected with the loan, though outside of it directly concerned, which justify asking a moderate rate of interest for the transaction. In giving a loan in itself we strip ourselves of the dominion of the amount, receive only the right to exact the amount loaned, and all profits accruing from the loan belong to the borrower as to him also belong the loss, if any be sustained either in capital or in profit.

"On the other hand for the regulation of loans the State makes laws by which a moderate rate of interest may be charged and it is lawful to accept this. In lending money also we lose a certain gain which we could otherwise have had and we are not obliged to diminish our profits to that extent because we are the lender and there is generally, if not always, a probable risk of loss, and a probable risk of loss is a probable loss for which we may receive compensation. The damage we sustain in being deprived of what we loan, the profit we lose, and the risk we run of losing are extrinsic reasons which permit the one lending to ask for and to accept a certain interest, because it is just that he who causes any damage should repair it and that our good will in lending should not be made prejudicial to ourselves. (St. Thom. 2, 2, Q 78, A 1), for as St. Liguori says, "A certain sum is more valuable than a doubtful sum." This doctrine is further confirmed by a decision of the Council of Lateran (Sess. 19, and a decision of the Congregation De Propaganda Fide, confirmed by Pope Innocent X. It is now the general opinion of the theologians that if none of these reasons exist a moderate interest allowed by custom and the law of the country may be taken with a safe conscience as long as the Church does not teach the contrary.

A moderate interest allowed by custom and the law of the country is all that can be asked for, and accepted in case of a loan, and to take advantage of the need of one's neighbor to ask above this for his accommodation is to commit the sin of usury: "If thou lend money to any of My people that is poor.... then thou shalt not be heard upon him as an extortioner, nor oppress him with usuries." (Exod. 22, 25, 3). Any amount exacted beyond this moderate interest, allowed by custom and the law of the country is an offence also against strict justice, and therefore includes with it the obligation of restoring the surplus extorted.

Injuring Another's Property.—To willfully injure another person's property is also a sin against strict justice and entails the obligation of making good in full all the damage done. If another's property is injured by a mere accident the one causing the injury,

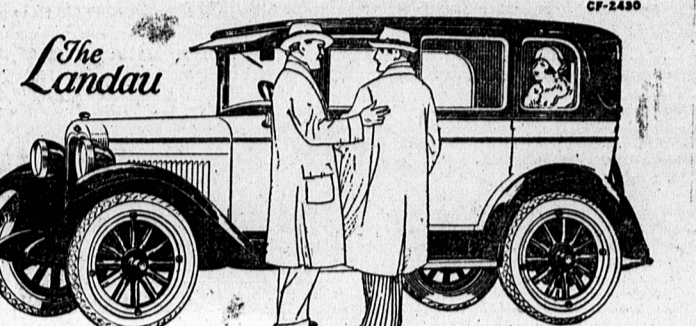

VICTORIAS WIN HARD BATTLE FROM MONCTON ROVERS 2-1

Saturday night at the Arena rink a very large turn out of hockey fans were on hand to witness the first of home and home games in the first of the play-off series for intermediate title of the Maritimes. The ice was heavy, which made accurate puck carrying impossible. Nevertheless the teams put up a very fine brand of hockey throughout the three sessions of sixty-minutes.

The Moncton Rovers are much heavier than the Vics and have the advantage of experience in the hockey game, however the speed of the colts more than offset this handicap as they waged right in to their opponent's from the first whistle.

The game was just as fast as any seen on local ice this season and was one of the cleanest, five penalties for minor offenses being handed out.

As for excitement and enthusiasm Saturday night's hockey fixture had it over any game yet and there was thrills no end from start to finish of a long to be remembered hockey struggle between two good teams.

For the visitors, Wilson in the net furnished the fans with a brand new line in net guarding, stick and skates were of little or no use to this worthy, as his style was something different from any goalie seen in action here this season, being more in the form of a good backstop in baseball. Nevertheless though he had a style all his own, he could use it and only for his brilliant performance the colts would have had a much wider margin.

Stevens and James on the defence teamed up well and gave an

exhibition of some splendid rink end runs. Banks, the centre man was the fastest man on the team and displayed a tidy bit of stick handling being assisted nicely on the front line by Bobkirk, who was responsible for the Rovers only score, taking the pass from Stevens who carried the length of the rink, shooting and taking the rebound passed to Bobkirk beating out Dillon on an impossible shot. Crowhurst also turned in a fine game as did Smith, Billveau and Ferguson.

For the home team, Dillon between the posts, although having an easy session in the opening, on P. Billveau and J. Nicholson receiving one shot dead on to his opponent's nine, turned in a great game in the dying stages of the last period, when the Monctonians threw all their attacking forces to the front line in an endeavor to annex a win, but time after time Dillon saved nicely. F. Doucette, who opened the entertainment in the first period for the only counter for the Vics played a steady hard game, working all through with the exception of his little two minutes rest in the penalty box for tripping.

D. Gillis, who put the game on ice with a fast wing shot from close range in the second period after Bobkirk had tied the count, Gillis plays a hard aggressive game and is game to the finish.

McDonald and Campbell the Vics defense man are a strong combination on the defense, each having a strong rush and a wicked shot that keeps the opposing goalie on the alert to keep out the dangerous ones. Alf "Bee" Doucette, whose sting is in his back checking and who covers more ice in five minutes than any other two players and yet is always in his place in front of the net to catch any rubber that may be passed out from hostile territory is giving every evidence of being the find of the season.

J. Trainor, Nicholson and Rush, the Vics relieving men were right on the job Saturday night.

THE GAME

In the first period the Victorias started out strong and bored right in on their opponent's line to hostile territory and gave the visitors the busiest twenty minutes they have experienced this season, the goalie being called on to save from many different angles, finally Frank Doucette on a pretty wing shot after twelve minutes of play beat him out for the first goal of the game and the last of the period, the session ending 1 to 0 for the Vics, one penalty to the Vics, McDonald, for a trip being handed out.

In the second session both teams started out rather slow, but soon swung into their stride and then travelled top speed, the play territory and scoring being evenly divided.

About five minutes from the face-off Bobkirk scored for Moncton on a pass from Stevens, evening the count, this had the tendency to speed the play and two minutes later Gillis found an opening, sending in a sizzling hot one that once again put the home team in the lead, for the remainder of the period both teams were very evenly matched although the visitors took their substitutes frequently to gain an edge on the play, but to no avail, the session ended 2 to 1 for the Vics, Banks and Ferguson of the visitors drawing two minutes each for a trip and F. Doucette two minutes for the same offense.

In the third period both teams worked harder and harder for control of the rubber, the visitors shoving up all their attacking forces to the front line and using spurs often in order to get at least an even break, but the Vics although showing signs of the fast pace set in the early stages were holding out strong and putting up bitter opposition when hard pressed and show-

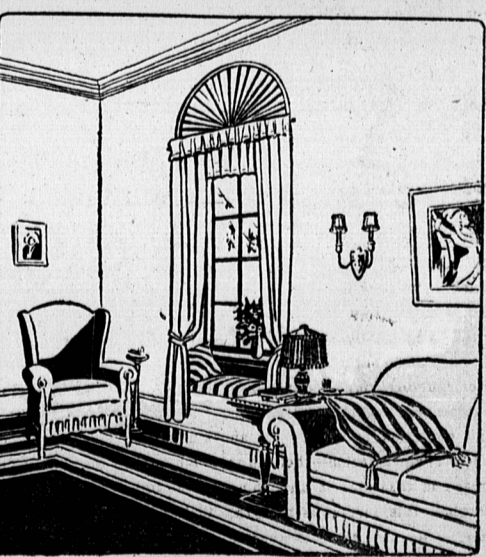
