REGINA DISASTER

Lake. The force of the storm is almost unbelievable. Houses were levelled, churches demolished, great warehouses overturned, and some houses have pieces of timber driven clean through the roofs. The north end district, which is populated by foreigners was swept absolutely clean, nothing is left of whole blocks but the foundations, and the ruins of houses have strewn the prairies for miles around. How anyone has escaped alive at all, is a miracle.

The Immigration Hall is full of refugees, and the schools have been turned into refugee camps. The Mounted Police galloping into the city and took charge of the patrol work upon request of the Mayor. One hundred special constables were also sworn in, and with the Mounted Police, are patrolling the streets.

With the lights all out the city is all in darkness, and most of it in ruins, and the armed guards patrolling the streets, it makes a weird sight. The death warnings are still driving up and down the streets. The wounded are still being found, and griefstricken people are hunting the ruins for relatives.

The area covered by the storm was three blocks wide, through the heart of the residential section, the railway yards, the wholesale district, a district inhabited by the laboring classes and a portion of the business section. Everything in the path of the wind was practically demolished. Starting at the South end of the city, the storm whirled straight North, leaving a path of destruction in its wake. Fully five hundred houses were absolutely wrecked, most of all was peace and quiet, then nothing but a mass of tumbling timbers.

Until suddenly circling up from the Southwest, an ominous cloud swept in circles, a rain was coming and no one regretted the fact. It was a day on which one welcomes storm. Back of the towering Parliament buildings, the black mass was sweeping. Suddenly it parted, one half swept Eastward and the other continued straight along its path.

In the twinkling of an eye the storm broke. First, all its fury fell upon the lake. There were some, the number is unknown, enjoying quiet paddle, or drifting lazily on the surface of the water, all unconscious of the impending tempest.

Quicker than it takes to read these lines, the wind swept down. With it plunged to the bottom of the lake. How many there are will not be known until the lake is dry. It is expected that the death list in the water will be large. There is dozens on the lake.

On and on came the tempest. The velocity of the storm increased. As the rolling clouds reached out over the town, there was death in those clouds and people sought safety in their homes. Better off indeed, would they have been, had they remained outside. Over the district of handsome residences the black monster appeared.

Homes were torn from their foundations and twisted as though they were built of matchwood. Tops were taken off buildings without number. Hundreds of houses were completely demolished. Beautiful gardens became the resting place of a mass of debris. People caught like rats in a trap faced death in their own homes. There
