In Memoriam

WILLIAM CAVENDISH McNEIL. On February 27th, 1928, William Cavendish McNeil of Harrington, P. E. I., was called to higher service in the Kingdom of God at seventy-nine years of age. Active and energetic to the last Mr. McNeil was an honored and respected elder of the Pastoral Charge of Covehead of the United Church of Canada. His passing has left a deep sense of loss both in our Church and community.

He was born May 4, 1849 at North Rustico, Mr. McNeil, when still a boy of fifteen years, moved with his parents to Elmsdale, Prince Co. Here, in due time, in recognition of his sterling Christian character, Mr. McNeil was elected an elder of the Presbyterian Congregation of Montrose. In 1882 he married Miss Emily L. McNeil of Cavendish who has been his loyal partner to the end of life's way. In 1917, Mr. and Mrs. McNeil moved to Harrington. In October of the same year Mr. McNeil was elected an elder of the Congregation of Covehead and Harrington, the duties of which solemn office he has faithfully and conscientiously fulfilled. He set a high standard of Christian living and Christian enlightenment in this community, and his strong character and Christian loyalty have been a great strength to our church. Besides his beloved wife

Mr. McNeil is survived by a son, Rev. John T. McNeill, D. D., Professor of Church History in Chicago University, two daughters, Mary, Mrs. Herbert Stewart of Harrington, and Jessie, Mrs. Albert Gorrell of Glenwood, Prince Co., a brother, Zwinglie McNeil at his late home in Harrington, and a sister, Margaret, Mrs. Albert Simpson, at Port Arthur. The sympathy of many friends goes out to these bereaved hearts and especially to his sorrowing wife. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. Thomas A. Wilson, in both his home in Harrington, and in the Church in Elmsdale, where he was assisted by Rev. G. A. D. Elliot, the United Church Minister in charge. The text of the funeral address was from Isaiah 3: 1-3. "Behold the Lord Jehovah of Hosts doth take away from Jerusalem and from Judah, stay and staff, the elder, the honorable man, and the counsellor." His remains were laid to rest beside those of his mother in the United Church Cemetery at Harrington, where the pall bearers at Harrington were Messrs. Edward Shaw, Albert Shaw, William Robinson, George Bearist, Colin McLure and Alexander Stewart, and at Elmsdale, Messrs. Fred Hardy, Lester Proffitt, Fulton Simpson, Alfred Simpson, James Stewart and Henry Williams.

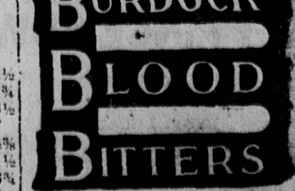
