METEOR OBSERVED.—A meteor of unusual brilliancy was observed Saturday night about 9.30 by those who were fortunate enough to be abroad at that time. The meteor's path was from east to west in the southern sky, and at an elevation of about 45 degrees. After the course of the meteor had been well defined for a considerable distance it exploded into fragments, making a most beautiful spectacle.

SHEEP DIPPING.—The Department of Agriculture is arranging for a second dipping outfit to give demonstrations in the western part of the Province, and on the forenoon of Tuesday, June 23rd, a dipping demonstration will be held on the farm of James Hogan, Rocky Point, and on Wednesday, June 24th, on the farm of Daniel McEwen, Long Creek. Everyone having sheep in this neighborhood is invited to bring them in and have them dipped free of cost.

DRUG STORES CLOSING.—At the annual meeting of the Druggists of P. E. Island in the Board of Trade rooms on Wednesday last it was decided, among other things, that the drug stores should close on Monday afternoons, one, however, remaining open for the convenience of persons having prescriptions to be filled. In future, also, the drug stores will be closed on Sunday afternoons, being kept open during the morning and at night. Owing to the rain the entertainment in honour of the visiting members of the Association could not be held.

LAYMEN'S MISSIONARY MOVEMENT.—There will be a very important meeting of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in St. James' Hall on Tuesday evening next, to be addressed by Mr. Caskey, Secretary of the Movement; Mr. How, Missionary from Japan; Mr. Rose, Mr. Hamilton and others. To make the meeting one of social intercourse, as well, it will be opened with a banquet at 6.30 p. m. sharp at which it is expected a large number of laymen will be present, as it will embrace all the evangelical churches.
