Scout News and Notices

Assistant District Commissioner for Rover Scouts, Mr. V. Collett, has been appointed High Sheriff for the City of Worcester, England.

An increasing number of American Boy Scout troops are visiting Ontario each summer, for the fun of roughing it in the "far north." A troop of 24 husky Cleveland Scouts, after a 12-day canoe trip into the small lake country north of Sudbury, came out in August to announce that they will return next year, "to penetrate further into the wild country."

Reports received at Boy Scout Headquarters, London, from all parts of the British Isles record valuable aid given by Scouts in connection with Air Raid Precautions during the week of tension previous to the Munich agreement. The Boy Scouts Association was thanked by the Secretary of State, Home Office. It is noted that the service arrangements of the Scouts will not be allowed to lapse.

In contrast to much European news comes word from Boy Scout Headquarters at London that details for the world gathering of Rover Scouts next year in Scotland include designation of English, French and German as official languages for the gathering. The Moot takes place on the grounds of Monzie Castle, near Crieff, Perthshire, and some 8,000 Rovers from all parts of the world are expected. Canada will be represented by a group or "patrol."

A 16 year old Boy Scout, Norman Peck, of Johannesburg, South Africa, was credited with saving 11 persons from drowning during a month's holiday at Blue Lagoon South Coast natal. Heavy rains had cut an opening through the lagoon wall into the sea, and created a strong current in which numbers of bathers were caught. In one rescue Scout Peck swam several hundred yards to save a younger brother, Derek Peck, and another boy when Derek had gone to assist, when both were being carried out to sea.

More than half of the 32 American college students selected as 1938 Rhodes scholars were Boy Scouts.

Scoutmaster Eldon Lucas, Sarnia, Ont., was credited with saving by resuscitation the life of a year old baby who had fallen head first into a pail of rain-water.

Boy Scout visitors to Vancouver this summer included 24 entering boys from Santa Ana, California, on a sightseeing tour in a \$1,400 truck. They had acquired the truck with money raised by selling fireworks. Their equipment included 13 small hike tents, with which they made an attractive camp in South Memorial Park.

A certain eastern Boy Scout Troop was given the duty of raising the Union Jack on the city for special occasions. There was a story behind the arrangement. For a certain holiday the city hall janitor ran up the flag, as was his wont. Presently someone called him on the phone to tell him the flag was upside down. "Oh, is it?" he replied in surprise. Someone called the City Clerk with the same information. "Oh, is it?" he returned. "I can't see any difference." He discovered there was a difference and so it was decided to let the Scouts do it, "and then it will always be done properly."

A number of unanticipated calls were made on the services of the Boy Scouts during the recent Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto. When 200 school children unexpectedly arrived from Port Huron, Michigan, the Scouts were asked to show them about the grounds in samll parties. On Children's Day an anxious airplane exhibitor sent an emergency appeal for Scouts to form a human fence, to protect his plane from a throng of crowing children. The most unusual call came when a downpour of rain interrupted a Bathing Beauty contest, and the Scouts were asked to supply umbrella holders for each of the fair contestants.

Wild Geese Gather At James Bay

The concentration of thousands of blue geese and large numbers of lesser snow geese around the southern end of James Bay is reported to the Department of Mines and Resources by the Chief Migratory Bird Officer, who has recently completed an inspection tour of that district. Numerous shore birds, including plovers, sandpipers and Wilson's snipe, are also reported in the James Bay area. The geese, which breed and nest on Baffin and Southampton Islands, north of Hudson Bay, begin to gather on the southern end of James Bay about the first week of September and remain in the region until about the end of October, before continuing their southward migration. So far almost none of this year's young have been seen, and it is a practical question of ornithological interest as to whether the younger birds are yet to come or if the breeding was a failure this year. By going to the remote northern regions to breed geese gain the advantage of being free from molestation by man but, on the other hand, they incur the dangers of inclement weather which sometimes occurs even in midsummer. The extensive feeding grounds provided by the marshes, swamps and tidal flats at the southern end of James Bay together with the roughly funnel-shaped outline of Hudson and James Bays, make this one of the greatest gathering places for wild geese and ducks on the North American continent. It is estimated that about thirty per cent of the wild geese hatched in the Arctic pass through this region on their autumn migration. Practically all the blue geese in existence and possibly one-third of the lesser snow geese make James Bay a stop-over point, before continuing southward to their wintering grounds in the vicinity of the Gulf of Mexico.

VESSEL HAS ODD STERRING GEAR

PICTOU, N. S., Oct. 20.—(CP)—The German freighter Hans Leonhardt, which slipped out of here without clearing at the height of the Czechoslovak crisis, has attracted wide attention because of her unusual steering arrangement. On the Leonhardt's bridge there are two wooden buttons, about three inches in diameter, placed on each side of a needle indicator. When the port button is turned, the ship turns to port and the needle indicates the deviation from a straight course. The starboard button operates similarly.

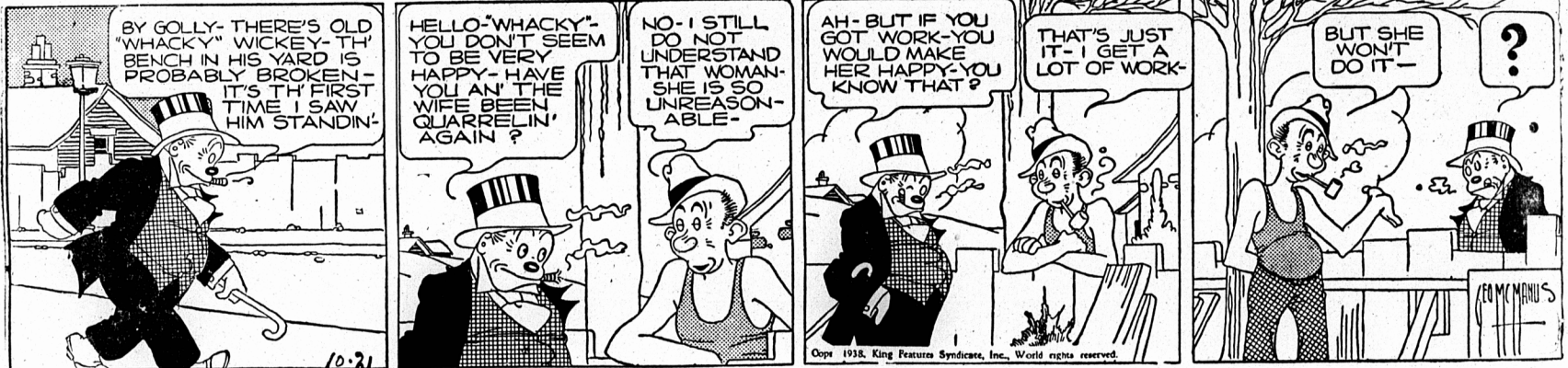

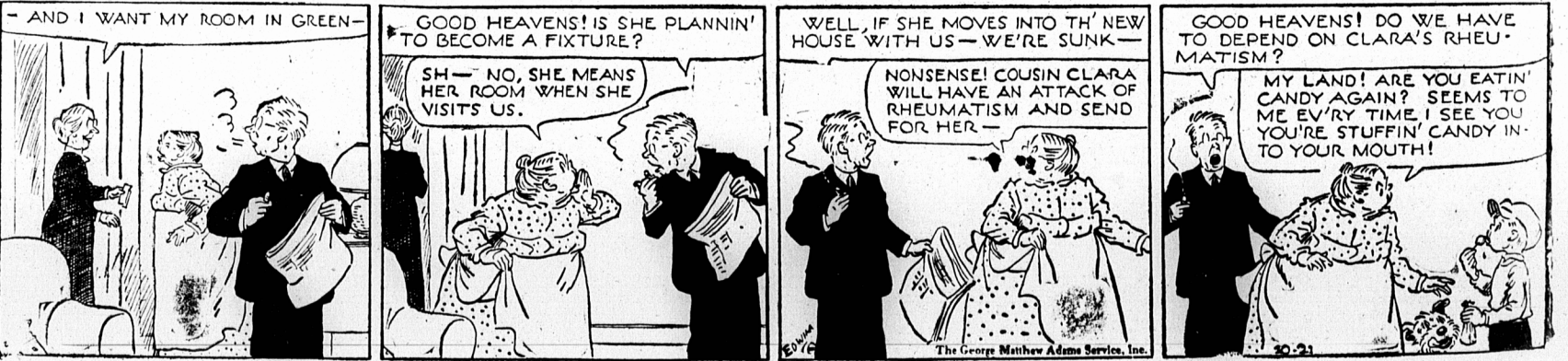

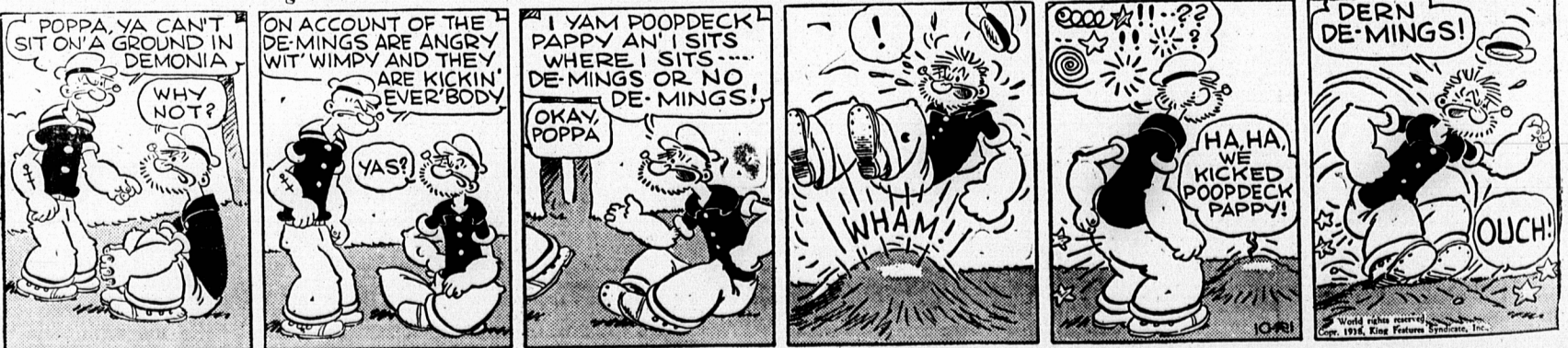
