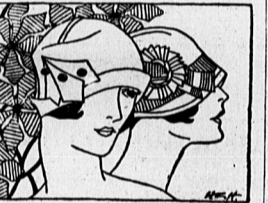

Government To Appeal Decision

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—The Government is taking steps to carry to the Privy Council by way of appeal the adverse judgment of a majority of the Supreme Court on the Canada Grain Act. Leave will be sought at the autumn sittings of the judicial committee.

It will be recalled that last winter the court gave judgment in a case which involved the constitutionality of the act and the finding was that the statute was ultra vires of the federal parliament. Contracts for the sale of grain were held to be within the provincial scope. It was suggested, however, that the situation might be rectified by declaring all elevators "works for the general advantage of Canada," this supposedly having the effect of extending to them the Dominion authority.

Such a declaration was made when the act was revised in the recent session, but an appeal is to be taken nevertheless from the judgment of the court here. If the reasons given by a majority of the judges were confirmed the validity of several other statutes would be questionable.

This is one day's chapter of the story of "Dick Whittington and His Cat." Children who save the paper dolls every day can act out the whole story with the dolls.

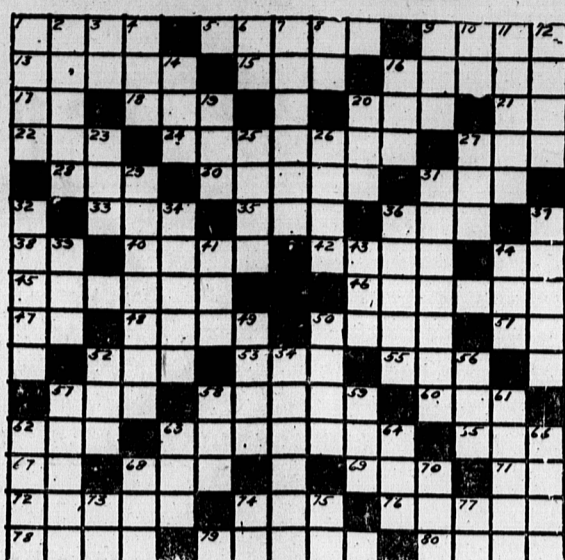

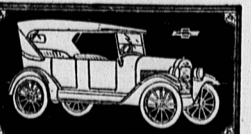

AVOIDING ACCIDENTS CUTTING CORNERS

This misdemeanor should be made a criminal offence, for it is downright suicide and murder. We have, in Charlottetown and other of our towns some of the finest streets built and there is absolutely no reason for the criminal act of cutting corners when turning.

One can readily see that the other driver has not a chance to defend himself against collision if he is turning to the right and a car turns and cuts the corner, turning to the left.

I have watched with interest the results of this, and I believe on almost every corner there can be seen the skids, some of them six feet long, where the nervous application of brakes has been necessary.

Some drivers are very careful, and make some very fine turns, and it is these drivers who have to suffer for the corner-cutter, for a head-on collision almost invariably means death. Such is the responsibility upon the shoulders of the driver who has no consideration for the other. The same applies to the driver who makes a wide right hand turn
