IT IS HOG COLERA ?

Word reaches The Guardian that a strange disease among hogs has shown itself at Union Road. One farmer with a pen of six hogs about ready for market left them all apparently in good health when last fed at night. In the morning one was dead. Next morning another was dead. Since then two more have died, and the remaining two have sickened. The owner, who has met with this serious loss, fearing that the disease may be infectious, has taken pains to bury the bodies of the dead swine. This is well, so far as it goes, but we are informed that much concern exists in the neighborhood lest the disease may spread, or break out on other farms.

In view of the great importance of the pork industry on the Island we think that this matter calls for a prompt investigation by a veterinary in order that the true character of the disease may be at once determined. It may turn out on investigation that the swine in question have died from some merely local cause. In that case a skilled investigation would remove and allay any needless alarm. If the disease should be found to be hog cholera, which is highly contagious as well as deadly, the fact cannot be too soon ascertained in order that the strictest precautions may be taken to prevent its spread and to dispose of the beasts dying of the disease. There ought to be an official inquiry by an expert in any case, and the promptest action should be taken in view of the great interests at stake.

Several Northwest papers charge Lord Minto with having violated the Sabbath during his Western hunting trip recently. The game laws of the North West Territories prohibit hunting on Sundays and the Act relating to the profanation of the Lord's Day places a fine of \$100 on any one who hunts on Sunday. If Lord Minto is guilty as charged he has done what no previous Governor General of Canada could be charged with and should be made to feel how strongly the public sentiment of the Dominion reprehends such conduct. Of all men the official head of the state should be expected to respect the laws.

Sir Geoffrey Macdon, who exercised a beneficial influence over the Kaffirs during the war in South Africa, reports a marked improvement in their condition of late. The sale of intoxicants to Kaffirs working in the Rand mines has been wholly prohibited and they are supplied with coffee instead. As a result, instead of 60 per cent of them being laid up on Monday, to recover from their Sunday's spree, not more than 3 per cent are so kept from work at present. The Kaffir laborers are also much more contented, there are few desertions where before there were many, and much more work is accomplished by the same number. All of which is highly gratifying.

Toronto has a new palace hotel, nearly ready to be opened, which is intended to surpass anything of the kind in the Dominion. It is an immense building, absolutely fireproof within and without, the exterior walls of brick and stone and the interior of metal and concrete. The King Edward Hotel, as it is called, is located on King Street, in the heart of the business district. It covers 32,000 square feet, contains 500 rooms, with 300 bathrooms attached to the bedrooms, all supplied with hot and cold water. Every room is connected with every other room by telephone. The hotel has a complete electrical plant of its own supplying light and the power to operate the elevators, laundry, &c. It will be conducted on both the American and European plans.

The meeting of the Farmers' Institute at Marshfield on Monday evening last encountered unpleasant weather and the attendance was small. It was called to discuss the proposed arrangement with the Dominion Packing Company. Mr. McKinnon M. P. was very zealous in support of the arrangement, while Peter McCourt was critical of its alleged merits. Several other speakers had questions to ask, and the meeting was adjourned till Monday, November 10th when a large attendance is expected. Our farmers do well to thus meet and discuss live topics in which they are vitally interested, and to hear what can be said on both sides. Much may be gained and nothing can be lost by full and free discussion. But the full text of the agreement made by the government ought to be laid before the public and then more intelligent and profitable discussion might be had. There is a general and very proper demand for the particulars of the agreement.

Under the head of The Aftermath of the Coal Strike the Scientific American points out that great permanent changes may and probably will result from the disturbance of previously existing conditions. There are thousands of homes in which, previous to the coal strike, the use of gas and coal oil for heating and cooking purposes was unknown, that have been driven by necessity to the use of these fuels and have formed such a good opinion of their qualities that they are certain to continue their use. Just how far this may affect the consumption of hard coal can only be known as the winter advances, but it is evident that in the future there is to be a great increase in the domestic consumption of oil and gas as fuel. In a recent visit to Montreal the writer found the same transformation of heating appliances as the Scientific American notes in American cities. Especially is the use of gas for heating being adopted, the rate in Montreal being 60 cents per thousand. Bituminous coal is also being largely used where hard coal was used invariably before.

The refusal of the Danish Parliament to consent to the sale of their small West India Islands to the United States is in accord with the wishes of a large majority of the people of the Islands. The official classes who have large influence with the people are no doubt largely responsible for this feeling. At the same time the islands are a source of annual loss to Denmark, and would no doubt make more rapid progress if transferred to the United States. The defeat of the sale was largely owing to the opposition party in Denmark which desires to embarrass the Government. The majority was narrow, and it seems not unlikely that the sale and transfer may yet be effected within a few years time.

It is gratifying to learn from Bradstreet's that Canadian failures for the first nine months of 1902 number only 851 a decrease of 18 per cent from last year, while the aggregate of liabilities reached only \$6,330,413, a decrease of 35 per cent. The failures in P. E. Island during the nine months past were 6 as against 7 last year with liabilities of \$39,423, against \$43,000 last year. In all the other Provinces except British Columbia the showing is much more favorable than last year.
