Property Committee Report To Council

The following report of the property committee for the month of May was submitted by Coun. C. M. Cox, chairman at the recent monthly meeting of the City Council:

"It has been brought to our attention that a number of trees have been removed, but none replaced. On looking over the area referred to, Hillsborough Square, for instance, we find several other trees that should be removed and would recommend that replacements be made in order to retain our trees.

"Complaints have also been made regarding the Dump—particularly the odor. On inquiry, we believe this was caused by undesirable refuse being dumped there by the Packing Houses. They have been notified to discontinue that practice. As long as the place was frozen, it was noticeable but when the frost came out and mixed with the stagnant water, the odor was terrible. We also noticed that very little fill was going to that dump mostly paper and cartons, which have to be burned in order to keep them from blowing around. Truckmen have been hauling to other places, probably after hours. If this is so, it might be advisable to keep this dump open till 9 o'clock, for some time. The Sanitary Officer has been instructed to have more supervision over the dump and see that all go to this one until it is filled which is the only solution to that problem.

"When this dump is filled, we understand the Provincial Government has a low section beyond the Exhibition Grounds which they will permit us to use on condition that we sell them the site we purchased for an Incinerator. I am not in a position to recommend that we sell this site, because I believe the only sanitary way to dispose of refuse is a high temperature incinerator and this is the only suitable site available that I know of. Of course, the cost is high both for installation and operation and we hesitate to recommend its immediate adoption if some suitable place can be secured for the present.

"We have had under consideration for some time another unsightly and unsanitary condition at DesBrisay Crescent. In fact, it is a worse looking dump than the east and we have complaints about the odor there. We recommend that the culvert be extended through this area and the whole surface covered with clay. This is another expensive job but we must protect the health of our citizens and try to promote more civic pride. We have as nice a city as is to be found in Eastern Canada, but a dirty one. Do we lack civic pride. "We have a request from Mrs. Harry Cudmore, representing the Red Cross Swimming Class, that we erect Bathing Houses at Brighton Road Shore and East End. A plan of these proposed houses was also submitted and the suggested cost would be approximately \$30,000. As an immediate reply was requested, I took the matter up with several Councilors including His Worship and we decided that owing to the very high expenses facing us that we could not see our way clear to grant the request. I have since had a telephone call from Mrs. Cudmore advising that the Red Cross is going to build the houses and requesting permission to place them in the most desirable location, which I think may be granted.

Bus Terminal Space "Several months ago a petition was presented to the Council signed by the merchants on Queen Grafton and Richmond Streets, requesting that space in the market basement be made available for a Bus terminal. During the interval our committee has given a lot of thought to this proposition and before making any recommendation to the Council we wished to get public opinion and with this in view we requested the Planning Board to take the matter under advisement. They have had three meetings on the question and have given careful consideration to all opinions both in favor of and against the proposal. In summing up, we find those in favor of the terminal far outweigh those against it. A brief has been prepared and I now submit it for the approval of the Council, also a unanimous resolution passed by the Board of Trade.
