HEAVY RAINS NEEDED TO HELP SHIPPING

Montreal Harbor Showing Signs of Present Hot Spell— Water Much Below Level.

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., July 8.—Only heavy rains over Lake Ontario and the upper St. Lawrence valley can relieve the situation in Montreal harbor where the level of water is 19 1-2 inches lower than the average level for June in the last 71 years, harbor officials stated today. The figures were supplied by the Department of Marine at Ottawa. Shipping has not been greatly affected as yet, but the passenger liners and large freighters are threatened by the low level, it was pointed out. Liners finding sufficient freight here to give them a draft greater than twenty-six feet, have to take on their fuel cargo at Quebec City, where the water is deeper.

PREM. SCORES MINISTER FOR COARSE JOKES

OTTAWA, July 8.—Heated exchanges between Premier R. B. Bennett and Hon. W. R. Motherwell, former Minister of Agriculture, featured continued debate in Committee on the Government bill creating a Tariff Board, tonight. The storm blew up following an earlier exchange, just before 6 o'clock adjournment, when the Prime Minister demanded to know of a single thing which Mr. Motherwell had ever done to protect the consumer in Canada. When he heard the former Minister of Agriculture indulging in his "coarse jokes," said Mr. Bennett, he felt that this was a question which required an answer. He demanded what legislation the Liberal Party had ever offered the people of Canada which attempted to do what the present Tariff Board was seeking to accomplish.

STATEMENT OF ISLAND LIB. IS REFUTED

Farmers Getting Their Fertilizer At Lower Prices Since Tariff Put Into Effect By Bennett Govt.

OTTAWA, July 8.—Declaring he had received resolutions of protest from every farmers' organization in the Maritime Provinces, A. E. MacLean, (Lib., Prince), in last night's debate on the new tariff board, condemned the tariff policy of the Bennett Government and in particular its effect on the price of fertilizer. The government, he said, was putting a powerful weapon in the hands of the manufacturers by raising the tariff, but was providing no way to protect the consumer. Direct issue with the statement was taken by B. F. Smith, (Cons., Victoria-Carleton), Farmers were getting their fertilizer at lower prices since the tariff, which only applied to the mixed product and not to the ingredients.

ANOTHER NEW U. S. FIRM FOR TORONTO, ONT.

TORONTO, Ont., July 8.—The largest manufacturer of oak flooring in the world, the E. L. Bruce Co., of Memphis, Tennessee, with ten plants and saw mills in six southern and middle western states, has completed arrangements for a branch plant in Toronto, according to an announcement last night by the Toronto Industrial Commission. The plant is to be built by the Laidlaw Lumber Co. Ltd., on its property at Dundas and Bloor Sts. F. E. Bruce is to be the Canadian manager and Captain W. Beaver, sales representative. The Industrial Commission has been associated with officials of the company since May, while negotiations for establishing the plant were in progress.

Much Lively Discussion At Fox Breeders' Meeting

Members Of The Canadian National Association, In Session At Summerside, Will Likely Conclude Meeting Today. Increased Membership For Past Year Reported.

There was a fairly large attendance at the 11th annual meeting of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association, with a full representation of delegates, visitors from other Provinces and representatives of the press from the Mainland. The meeting opened in the Agricultural Hall, Summerside yesterday morning, President Mr. G. Shelton Sharp in the chair. He regretted that the Government officials from Ottawa could not be present on account of the house being in session. There were however, a full representation of directors and Mr. R. H. T. Hitchman registrar of the Canadian Livestock Records at Ottawa. Mr. B. S. Deacon, Secretary, read the minutes of the previous annual meeting which were adopted on motion of Mr. Gavin Harding, Charlottetown, and seconded by Mr. Kennedy, Charlottetown. This was followed by the directors report read by Mr. Deacon:

DIRECTORS' REPORT

The Directors of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association take pleasure in presenting for your consideration the eleventh Annual Report reviewing the activities of the Association during the past year. The membership during the calendar year ending December 31st last reached a total of 6588 or 322 more than the year previous, which exceeded that of the year before by 732. So far the paid up membership this year amounts to 4550, which is divided by Provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island 1004 New Brunswick 947 Nova Scotia 476 Quebec 834 Ontario 488 Manitoba 170 Saskatchewan 126 British Columbia 149 Alberta 265 Residents of other Countries .. 91

Two thirds of the decrease took place among the Board Members as against one third among actual fox ranchers. When the generally depressed business conditions are considered, the drop in membership is not as severe as there was reason to anticipate it might be. It is a fact that the older breed organizations have all had their ups and downs and we may confidently look forward to the recovery of the ground lost when world conditions improve as they are bound to and some state they are already beginning to. During the last inspection season your Inspectors marked 96,616 puppies and inspected 92,823 which was the greatest number ever examined. The number transferred during the calendar year 1930 was 28,943 which was also a high water mark. In 1931 the transfers already made amount to approximately 10,000 so that the total for year may be expected to reach a substantial figure.

To insure a uniform standard of inspection, supervisors were appointed for the different inspection districts and the Chairman of the Inspection for Registration Committee travelled from Coast to Coast checking up on the work being done and especially to see that the supervisors all had the same standard before them. The Board feel justified in stating that a more uniform standard was enforced throughout Canada than before and many letters of appreciation have been received expressing satisfaction at the manner in which inspection was carried out. The Inspectors began their work on the 4th day of August and by the 10th of October practically all ranchers whose papers had been filed at the proper time and where no irregularities existed, had been marked. Inspection then commenced and was carried out expeditiously and practically completed by Christmas. The registered fox population of Canada in 1930 was as follows:

Practically every Province showed a reduction in cost per unit but as proportionately the increase in the number of puppies was greatest in the high cost Provinces, the average cost showed an increase. This situation shows little indication of changing and in order to reduce the costs of registration with a consequent saving to the members, ways and means of reducing inspection and registration costs must be worked out. This the Directors have carefully considered and if the meeting adopts the amendments sponsored by the Board, a savings of 25 cents a pup would seem practicable. Wives Of Post And Gatty In Plane Crash

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 8.—An airplane bearing the wives of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, round-the-world fliers, cracked up as it landed at Port Columbus shortly before six p.m. tonight. The accident occurred just after the arrival of Post and Gatty in the world gridding plane the "Winnie Mae." The women were not injured. The couples were enroute from the east to their homes in the west. The officials of the Lockheed Vega Corporation were riding with Mrs. Post and Mrs. Gatty. The plane, the same type as the Winnie Mae, ground looped in landing. One wing and the landing gear were broken although the ship did not overturn. The plane had followed the Winnie Mae since the party took off from municipal airport, New York, this morning. Post and Gatty landed safely and were climbing from their plane when their wives crashed.

Beauharnois Investigation

OTTAWA, Ont., July 8.—In order to remove "an obstruction" the Beauharnois Power Syndicate purchased the assets of the Sterling Industrial Corporation with a capital of \$2,500, for 2,000 shares of the syndicate which at one time had value of over \$1,000,000. This was the highlight of the evidence offered to the Beauharnois investigating committee today by H. E. Griffith, secretary-treasurer of the Beauharnois Power Corporation. The Sterling Investment Corporation, Mr. Griffith said, was incorporated in 1924 and on the same day filed an application with the Dominion Government for the right to divert water from the St. Lawrence River through a scheme similar to that of the Beauharnois
