Owing to two deaths in the neighborhood the basket social and entertainment in Pownall Hall is postponed till Monday evening March 23. If not fine social will be held first fine evening.

A meeting will be held in Mill View Hall on Monday evening March 23rd at 7 o'clock for the purpose of considering the advisability of the running of automobiles. Hon. F. L. Hazard, Hon. D. P. Irving, and other members of the Legislative are invited to be present.

John A. McIver, formerly a school teacher at Kinkora, P.E. Island, who came to Oakland, California, last August, and has been in the employ of the Oakland Traction Consolidated ever since that time, has accepted the position of principal of the public school at Midway, Alameda County, Cal.

In his capacity as trustee for the united banks, which took over the affairs of the Sovereign, W. E. Stavert a native of Summerside entered action in Montreal against D. M. Stewart, for \$110,000, for losses incurred in certain transactions while Mr. Stewart was manager. Mr. Stewart is suing on behalf of the Bank of Montreal, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Bank of Toronto, Dominion Bank, Bank British North America, Standard, Bank of Hamilton, and the Eastern Townships bank.

The death of James Flynn, which took place at his home on Euston Street, Friday afternoon, March 20, removes a well known and highly respected citizen of Charlottetown. Mr. Flynn had only been ill a short time, and the news of his death will be learned with genuine regret by many. Deceased who was in his eighty-third year, leaves to mourn a widow, and seven children, John in this city Thomas, Richard and Edward of Boston, Mass; also Mrs. Stone of Boston, Miss Annie of Boston, and Mrs. Fitzpatrick of this city. The funeral takes place Sunday afternoon from his residence Euston Street at 2.45 to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to the R. C. Cemetery.

The trial of Carl Sekjer, charged with false pretences has begun in the Court of King's Bench at Montreal before an English jury. While the jury was called, R. A. E. Green-shields, who acts as counsel for the accused, raised the old question as to the nationality of jurymen. The Court ruled that it was sufficient that the jurymen speak and understand English. A year ago, the following advertisement appeared in the Montreal newspapers: Wanted.—Young man of experience, with capital at his command to join me in export trade from Canada to England. Applicant, if accepted, must go to England to take charge of office there. Large income to the right man." Daniel McIntyre, Montreal, a former student of St. Dunstan's College, in Charlottetown and who visited in Charlottetown a short time ago, answered the advertisement and a deed of partnership was drawn. While McIntyre would look after the business in England, Sekjer would stay here and look after the money. McIntyre received power of attorney to manage the affairs in London, and also two blank checks on the London and Montreal banks, with a marginal note to the effect that withdrawals were not to exceed £30 every time, and were to be subject to instructions. McIntyre related how Sekjer had told him that he had shipped 270 cases of eggs to England to the firm's name, "John McGregor & Co." and that he was to take charge of that shipment as soon as he got there. All information was to be given him by a certain Major Hill. McIntyre spent the first few days in trying to locate the firm, but he had to turn to Major Hill for help. This gentleman said that he had never heard of John McGregor & Co., but he showed McIntyre a room in the building which had been formerly occupied by a person known as Sekjer, and on the door of which hung the sign "To let." Then McIntyre went to the bank, and they told him that they had not the pleasure of Mr. Sekjer's acquaintance. McIntyre looked for 270 cases of eggs, but could not find them anywhere. A cablegram from Sekjer announced that the eggs had been sold, but that another shipment was following. McIntyre waited for that shipment, but it did not arrive. In July he received another letter from his partner, stating that more eggs had been shipped. This gave McIntyre a renewed energy in his search and he might be still at it if funds had not become exhausted and he returned to Montreal. After some stormy explanations between the two men, Sekjer was arrested on the charge of false pretences and on another of theft.

The cost of introducing the new system of book-keeping on the Government railways was not \$343,000 as stated in these columns a few days ago, but \$43,000. The error occurred in the transmission of an Ottawa telegram. Many newspapers were misled by the same error. The work extended over a year and a half, we are told, and engaged the attention of some thirty expert accountants.

At a meeting held in Alexandra Schoolhouse, on Monday last to discuss the automobi question, a resolution was passed, asking the Legislature to prohibit the running of these machines on Sundays and market days, and on all public holidays, and to stringently regulate their indiscriminate travel on the country roads in regard to speed, making the owners liable for all damages from accident.

Died at Little Sands, March 15 Miss. Rodrick McLeod, in the 86th year of her age. She immigrated from the Isle of Skye, Scotland, with her parents in the year 1836. She was the daughter of the late Peter McLeod Dundas. She leaves to mourn a husband and two daughters, Mrs. Joseph Masticco, of Roxbury, Mass, and Mrs. John McPherson of Little Sands, also one brother, Malcolm McLeod of Dundas, and four grand-children; also a large circle of friends, to mourn the loss of one that was always loved and respected. When very young she joined the Presbyterian Church, Dundas, of which she was an honored member. She moved to Little Sands, 31 years ago where her kind and gentle disposition made a host of friends for her. For the last year she had been in failing health. She was a loving wife and mother and a true Christian. Her end was peace.

G. and Mrs. Bell, DeSable, are visiting in North River the guests of Mrs. John Walker. The officers of the Salvation Army will conduct services in Hertz Hall tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock. Potatoes are selling in Charlottetown at 35 cents per bushel and oats, black 46 cents, white 45 cents. The High Court Officers of the I. O. F. will visit Court Abegweit, Pownall, Wednesday evening March 25th. All grades of refined sugar advanced ten cents per hundred weight yesterday, which makes a total advance of 50 cents per hundred weight since January. It is expected in Montreal that ocean liners will steam into that port by 15th April, owing to the mild winter. When shall we have the port of Charlottetown opened? Quite a few teams came in from Long Creek yesterday by the ice which was reported to be very poor. The trees marking the route have in some places disappeared altogether. Yesterday afternoon there was a great deal of driving around the City and the principal streets presented a lively appearance as the recent snow fall made very good sleighing. The market yesterday was poorly attended. There was quite a scarcity of butter, not nearly enough to supply the demand. What offered was quickly bought up at 28 cents per pound. In reply to Mr. McLean M. P. on 16th March in the House of Commons Hon. Mr. Fielding stated that the first instalment of the new subsidy was paid to the Government of Prince Edward Island on November 30, 1907 and that \$19,500 was deducted therefrom on account of the Hillsboro Bridge.
