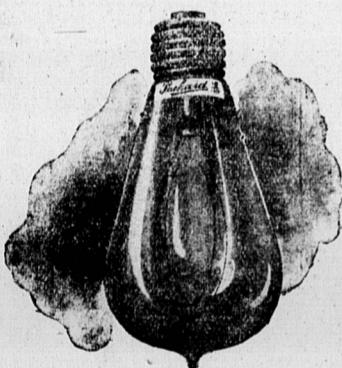

### STEAMSHIP'S RACE TO SAVE DUTY

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—Steamships with merchandise from France, Switzerland and Bulgaria are racing across the seas to be here before the customs house closes Saturday afternoon, on which day the present commercial treaties with those countries will expire.  
The treasury department at Washington has instructed Collector Loebe to keep all departments of the customs house open until 4.30 p. m. Saturday to give the speeding steamers an opportunity to reach here and file their bills under the old tariff laws.  
Higher duties will be imposed on goods from France and the other countries under the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill, which will be effective after Saturday. Importers placed heavy orders for goods after the passage of the law, so as to have them delivered here prior to its enforcement.  
Not only has the New York custom-house been ordered to remain open until 4.30 p. m. Saturday, but the same order has been sent to all collectors of customs in Chicago and other cities.  
The acts of congress do not recognize Saturday afternoons as half-holidays.  
With the return of Ambassador Jusserand to Washington from Paris, the negotiations between France and the United States regarding the application of the new tariff act have been transferred to this country, and the terms of the agreement will be worked out in Washington.

### LEAVES MILLION FOR EDUCATION

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—The will of Caroline Phelps Stokes, sister of Anson Phelps Stokes, and aunt of J. G. Phelps Stokes and Mrs Robert Hunter, who died at Redland, Cal., on April 26 last makes specific bequests of more than one hundred thousand dollars to charitable institutions, and leaves the residue of an estate estimated at between three million and five million dollars for the erection of modern tenements, the education of negroes in Africa and the United States, and for the education of North American Indians and needy and deserving white students.  
The testator asks that the fund be applied by a committee she names, which consists among others of the Protestant Episcopal bishop of New York, the chancellor of New York University, the Rev Dr Lyman Abbott, Arthur Curtis James, Miss Grace H. Dodge, her sister Olivia Eggleston Phelps.  
Miss Stokes directs that the money be used to establish industrial schools similar to that at Northfield, Vt., and the Peak Industrial school at Asheville, N. C.  
The American Humane Society gets twenty thousand dollars to circulate free of charge "Black Beauty" and others of its publications. The Tuskegee Institute gets ten thousand dollars for a chapel the Calhoun colored school ten thousand dollars, and Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va., (colored) ten thousand dollars.  
To the Ansonia Free Library at Ansonia, Ct., is left twenty thousand dollars; a similar sum is left to the American Humane Educational Society of Boston, and twenty thousand dollars to the school for girls at Northfield, Mass.

### LAST EVENING'S PRAYER SERVICE

He (Mr Greatorex) regretted he would not be here to attend these services, but would pray for their success. Rev Mr Greatorex suggested passing along religious tracts, and cards, etc. he had found them a great blessing, and the means of conversion to many precious souls. The singing of familiar Hymns was heartily entered upon by the congregation and several prayers offered for the blessing of God upon the Evangelistic services by Dr Elliot commencing Thursday next.  
Before closing the Rev Geo E. Ross referred to Rev Mr Woodroof's cooperation in the coming campaign, thanking Rev Mr Greatorex for helpful assistance while here, and also St Paul's Church for the use of their Hall. If all were true that he (Rev. Mr Ross) had heard about Rev Mr Murphy who would arrive next week to take up the duties of Rector of St Paul's, this Church was to be congratulated, and the City and ministers would welcome him in the spirit of Christian fellowship. The meeting was closed by Rev Mr Thomas pronouncing the benediction.  
Two Union Prayer Services will be held in First Methodist Church Tuesday and Wednesday next week and Thursday Dr Elliot commences his Missions.

TORONTO, Oct 28—The feeling throughout Canada for the past few weeks that there would be no Olympic games in Greece next year is confirmed by a letter to Elwood Hughes from a Greek naval officer who is in close touch with affairs in Greece at the present time. The heads of affairs are too busy with the militia troubles at present to give any time to committee work in connection with any set of Olympic games. 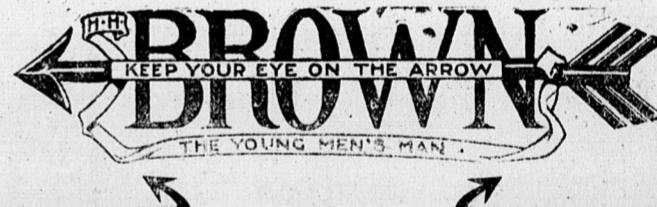

### COSTLY SEASON ON THE GREAT LAKE

DETROIT, Oct. 28—A total of twenty-five lives and property worth two million dollars is the toll taken by the great lakes waters and reefs, the gales that raged over them, fire and accidents in which failure of machinery or men was the cause on the boats that sail the inland seas to Oct 25. With the dangerous fall weather still to come, it is quite probable that these figures will be increased before the last boat ends its chase for gold.

### UNIONISTS ARE VICTORIOUS.

LONDON, Oct 29—The bye election in Bernadsey division of Southwark, a Preliminary Borough of London, was characterized by the most militant attack which the Suffragettes have yet ventured to make. The result was a sweeping victory for the Unionists. John Dumphrey's the Unionist candidate won the three cornered fight, with a plurality of 827, overcoming the Liberal majority of 1,509 in 1908.  
The Unionist victory is considered a severe blow to the supporters of the Budget, because this election was expected to afford good test of the feeling in London and the country generally on the impending struggle in Parliament.
