The closing and annual display of work of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild was held in the Writing Room of the "Charlottetown" on Thursday afternoon, May 27th.

A great many interested members and friends were present to admire the wonderful result of the year's work.

Even without war knitting garments numbered in the hundreds and when it is remembered that in January of this year the Guild sent 310 children's garments to the "Save the Children Fund" it is indeed a matter for congratulation on the amount of work accomplished.

Pride of place was given to a beautifully bound and illustrated book commemorating the silver wedding of Their Majesties King George and Queen Elizabeth. This book was inscribed and sent by Her Majesty Queen Mary to the Secretary of the Charlottetown Branch for the members as a token of her appreciation of the work done by the Guild. Accompanying this was a letter from Her Majesty's lady in Waiting which reads as follows:

Thanks are due to Mrs. Foster and the staff of the Charlottetown for many courtesies extended and to those of the Executive who assisted in making this display such an outstanding success.

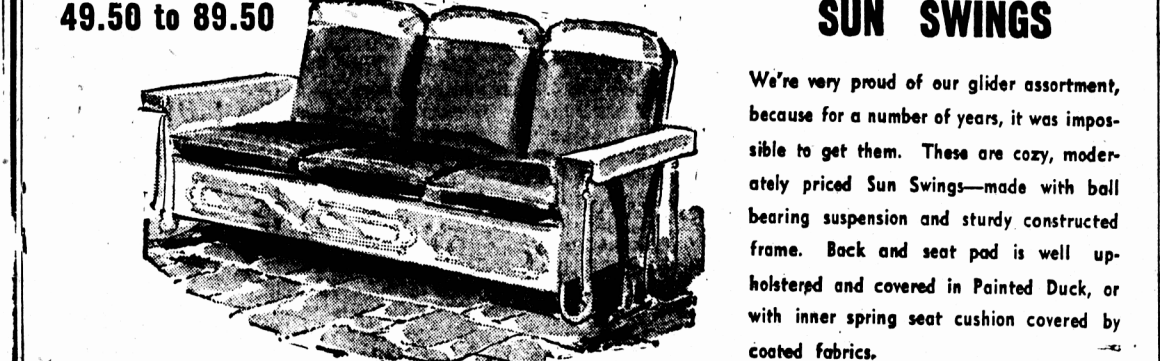

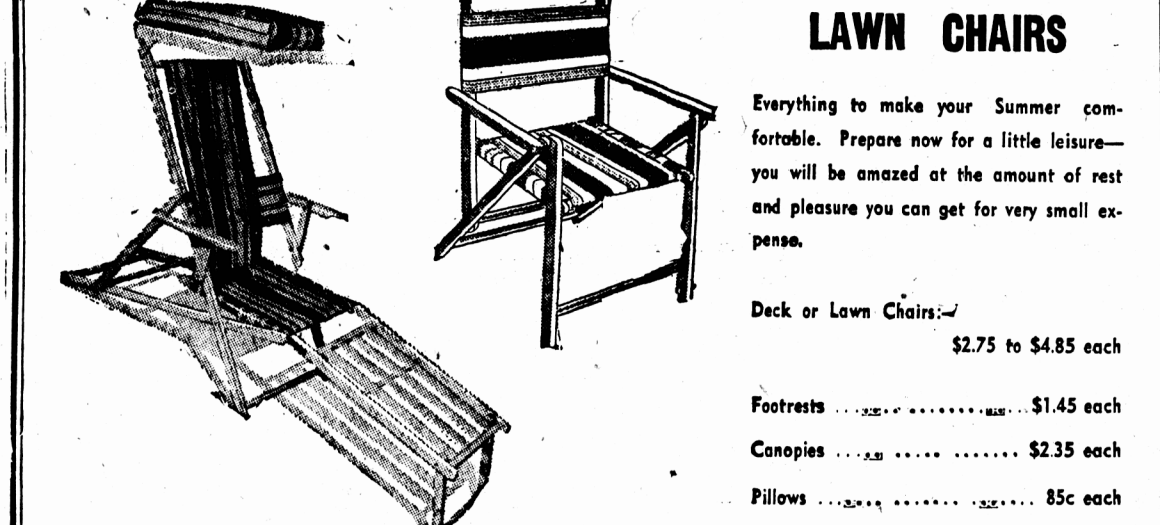

All mixed in a tasty hodge podge that was a thick stew. It was eaten with vegetables and a communal roll from which one tore a spiral before passing the bread to a neighbor.

"And now" one of the more travelled said "we'll go shopping." I spoke up meekly: "I should like to buy a card!" "A card!" they echoed as one. "Well let's see" one volunteered "we'll go to..." A second lady said "No, we'll go to..." they're better there!" and the third remarked "don't you think you get

more worth for your money at... besides they have an escalator there and Ellen's never seen one yet!" The place chosen must have been at the far side of the city for we returned with tired limbs but with the card and having seen but not yet ridden on the moving stairway, that thrill doubtless reserved for a later date!

However, pleasantly our day has been spent as indeed, the entire week about gone by. I may not dwell too long on my departure from Alderlea which, though it might only have been a fancy of mine, I left rather lonely. Even Pat turned back from accompanying the car to the hilltop on slow feet. And when I turned to look back James was going along the fields to Rob's on his way to the other farm to take the Spring machinery from its storing there. I remember now, the red shores of the homeland fading from sight as we commenced our travelling.
