PROFIT TAKING ON N.Y. MART

(By Frank MacMillan) (Associated Press Financial Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 30 - The stock market rode out a squall of profit-taking today with only minor damage.

After a brisk opening the market was called on to absorb generous offerings from traders who appeared to feel the upward pace had been a little too rapid recently. Many leaders changed hands for a time at a loss of major fractions to a point or so. Mild support was in evidence late, however, and many active issues closed better than their lowest, with a fair scattering of plus signs in evidence.

Some specialties went virtually unscathed through the realizing wave, notably the aircraft shares, some of the oils and a few carrier equities. These showed a staying power from the opening going undented even or moderately ahead in most cases.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at 46.8 was off 4 of a point from the 1935 peak established Monday. The loss was fairly evenly divided among the industrials, rails and utilities making up the compilation. Turnover for the day aggregated 1,681,080 shares.

The day's big news came after the close of stock trading when U. S. Steel revealed its second quarter loss of \$762,493 and declared the expected 50-cent dividend on the preferred stock.

Followers of the steels were encouraged by the declaration of an extra dividend of 25 cents by Inland Steel in addition to its regular 50-cent payment.

Most of the recent favorites dipped fractions of 2 points or a little more, among them American Telephone at 130 1-2, Bethlehem at 142 1-2, American Can at 142 1-2, International Harvester at 51 3-4, Westinghouse at 64 1-8 and U. S. Steel at 43.

Husband Held For Wife's Death

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SANFORD, Me., July 30 - Recorder Lester Willard today continued to Saturday a charge of murder against Edward Hill, 51, who is charged with slaying his wife, Sarah, 61, yesterday.

The woman a native of New Brunswick was found fatally injured, and died later in a hospital of a fractured skull. Hill was arrested after police said they found near the spot a stick of firewood with what they described as blood and human hair on one end of it. Hill claimed innocence, and declared his wife had slipped and fallen down the stairs.

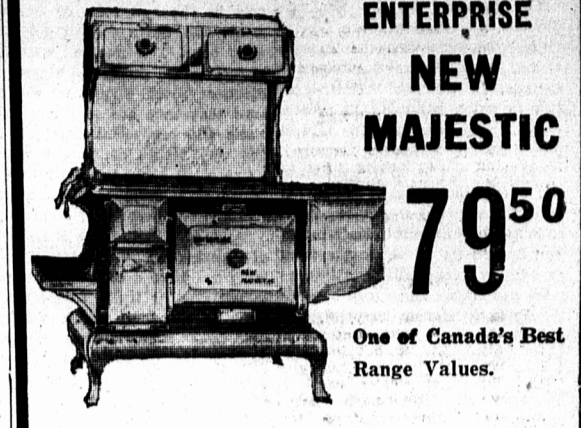

POWER ISSUES LEAD CLIMB

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, July 30 - Power issues took over the leadership of the Montreal Stock Exchange today and climbed to higher levels with the other stocks following close behind.

Ignoring a weak market in Wall Street, where profit taking were in action, followers here dabbled heavily and at the final bell gains had a wide margin over losses.

Outstanding was B. C. Power with a gain of 1-2 points to 24 1-2 while Canadian Northern Power touched a new 1935 high of 21 1-2, up 5-8 of a point.

Quebec Power firmed 3-4 of a point at 14 3-4 while Shawinigan mounted 1-8 point to 16 5-8. Subsequent profit taking for the past few days, Montreal Power managed to hold steady with an advance of 1-8 point at 30 7-8.

Declines were general in the textile group, in which section heavy loss has prevailed for some time, and was sharply in evidence yesterday. Canadian Cottons, which yesterday fell to a new low for the year, again slipped further to a new 1935 bottom of 44 off a point.

Bruck Silk was heavy and dropped 1-2 point to 16. Canadian Celanese advanced 1-4 point to 23 1-4. Reports yesterday by officials of Canadian Pacific Railway of lower earnings for the first six months of 1935 did not have its effect until today when the stock dropped 3-8 of a point to 10. The issue recently had been strong.

In the steel group, steel of Canada advanced 1-4 point to 49 3-4 while Dominion Steel and Coal "B" was off 1-8 point to 4 5-8, its first change in several days. Dominion Coal preferred new was selling ex-dividend and advanced 1-2 point to 17.

Total sales were 9,730 shares; bonds \$6,350.
