sion to report upon the serious charges that were brought against certain magistrates and prosecutors. I wish to call the attention of the House very shortly to Judge McLeod's report. We have all seen how, after his report came down, those who were disappointed in not having proved the charges they had made, immediately attacked Judge McLeod and made statements which were altogether unjustified and of a character most injurious to the administration of justice in this province. I don't say that all those charged with judicial duties should be free from public censure, but I do say that the man who undertakes to impugn improper motives to any judge requires to be very certain of his ground and be able to prove it. I don't say that the man who assumes such a serious responsibility, after all that is said that forms the strongest bond between all parts of the British Empire to-day but the confidence that all have in the Justice of British Government, in the uprightness of British Courts? I believe that I have the support of every member in the House when I say that the report which Judge McLeod has made has been unimpeachable.

AN UNIMPEACHABLE RECORD.

It is now approaching a quarter of a century since he went on the bench, and during all that time, I am informed, there was only one single case in which a judgment of his was challenged. We knew him before that as Attorney General of the province, as Premier of the province, and for many years a man holding a high position in public life; and never before was his character or his reputation assailed until it happened that he did not hold with those men, that he was not ready to condemn upon evidence which he thought was insufficient.

Now, what are his findings? He deals first with the charges that were made against Mr. Phillips as prosecutor; and if there is one man among them all who has been followed with measureless malignity, it is that man Phillips. Now, it is true that Mr. Phillips is not a first-class accountant, and I believe there may be some truth in the charge that he is not a perfect man; but you know it is a little difficult to get a perfect man to accept the position of prosecutor. It is a little difficult to get a perfect man to act as a magistrate and judge, we have no perfect men in this country. The best that we erring mortals can do is to strive towards a higher standard of conduct, and those gentlemen who have set the standard so high that they have put themselves clean above all constituted authority and powers, have raised the standard so high that we cannot see it.
