TWO-MAN CREW ABOARD THE SPEEDY LITTLE 58-FOOT TORPEDO BOAT HORNET

Hints for the Motorist

REPAIRING WORN VALVE GUIDES AND SEATS. J. K. Writes: Grinding the valves of my engine no longer makes them seat properly and I find that their stems fit loosely in their guides. Should I use valves with oversize stems and how much oversize? Is there any way of having the surfaces refinished so that there will be better seating. Answer:—If your valve-guides are furnished with bronze bushes these should be measured until they fit by measuring their holes, you can tell whether large enough oversize stems can be obtained for them. If they are worn beyond the possibility of fitting them with oversize stems the bushes should be pressed out and new ones put in to fit standard valves. In case the guides are not bushed you should have them reamed to size and see if you can get stems large enough to fit them. If not, perhaps you can have them bored out and fit bushes in them. It will be necessary after you have fixed up the guides, to have the valves reamed to fit. This is counterbalancing operation required to make the seats truly conical and concentric with the guides as well as to remove any shoulders that wear may have caused.
