Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 80 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected with the title under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three consecutive years. (2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, if the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the land. (4) A monthly notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N. W. QUEEN'S CO. S. S. CONVENTION

This Sunday-School District Convention of North West Queens held its first sessions on the 19th inst. The attendance was not as large as usual owing to the holding of the annual School meetings in different school districts keeping many of the men at home. Wm. Laird, President, opened the meeting with religious exercises, and Miss Irene Clark Ass't. Secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting held last fall at Stanley Bridge. The Superintendent and representative of the different schools present reported. These reports were very encouraging, showing that all the schools heard from were in a flourishing condition. The President gave a report of the work of the year and the Rev. A. S. Stewart gave an interesting and profitable address on the S. School as a factor in the moral and spiritual training of the rising generation. The Field Secretary, Rev. J. B. Gannon, gave a history of the union of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Association and showed clearly the different departments of work that the Association was trying to carry on. He asked for the corporation of all the Sunday School workers, in the endeavor to make this year the best in its history. School work of any in its history. The evening session was opened with religious exercises, led by Daniel McDonald. The Nominating Committee reported the following persons as the officers of the Association for the next year: Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, President; Daniel McDonald, Vice-Pres; Miss Irene Clark, Secy-Treas. All the ministers of the district to be members of the Executive Committee. The report was adopted. The new President then took the chair and spoke a few words of encouragement to the workers present, urging them to be zealous with Christ in the Sunday School work and so to be co-workers with him in the resulting glory. The Rev. Mr. Belyea also gave a pointed address on the necessity of Teacher Training Classes—what they are and how to organize them and taught a lesson on Bible study as a sample of what the course provides. All present seemed deeply interested in this subject. The Field Secretary then gave an excellent address, emphasizing the need of teacher training, stating it to be the need of the Sunday Schools at the present time. He also showed clearly that we used just as much the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit. His address was well received by the audience and made a strong impression. The Field Secretary on this, his first visit, to this district, appeared to reach the hearts of the people. Rev. Mr. Miller spoke in a very helpful manner of how to make the Convention profitable after it closes. Then followed addresses by Messrs. Boston, Robert Andrews, and Daniel McDonald. All testified to the benefit they had received from the meetings.

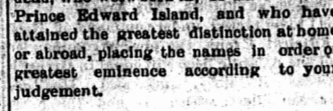
