out a comparison with our fiscal year. That was never given. The record in the Journals of the Government would give us a six-months statement; the total included the subsidy, and it was information that was worthless to us. They absolutely refused, year after year during all that time to give us the three months' statement that would enable us to make a proper comparison with former years. We are not going to give the hon. gentleman what he has not asked for. We are not going to give him anything absolutely but what he has asked for; and that is what we should have got but what we did not get. However, I don't blame him for that. I presume his object is to serve the public properly and do his duty at a leading member of this House. We presume that and the same should have been presumed in former years. However, he might not have been as bad as the rest were.
