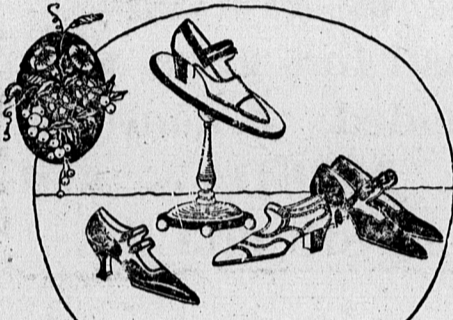

THE LATE A. J. BIFFIN

The sad news of the death Fri-
 day night in the Royal Victoria
 Hospital, Montreal, of Mr. Arthur
 J. Biffin, a well known and high-
 ly respected citizen, for about
 twenty-six years the representa-
 tive in Charlottetown of Hodgson
 Bros., the largest exporters of
 cheese and butter in Montreal.

Mr. Biffin who was born in
 Brighton, England, about 52 years
 ago, came to Canada when a lad
 and worked in Ontario before com-
 ing to Prince Edward Island
 where he was engaged in dairy
 work for the Department of Agri-
 culture, being employed as cheese
 maker at O'Leary and Stanley
 Bridge before taking a position
 with Hodgson Brothers.

Mr. Biffin had been in failing
 health for some time and went to
 Montreal with the intention of un-
 dergoing an operation, but unfor-
 tunately his condition was so se-
 rious that the operation could not
 be performed.

The deceased, who was a very
 competent business man, and had
 an extensive and thorough know-
 ledge of the dairy industry, had
 many warm friends in this city
 and province who will sincerely
 deplore his death in the prime of
 his manhood.

He leaves to mourn a widow
 (nee Miss Gertrude McEachern),
 one son Ralph, who accompanied
 him to Montreal, and three daugh-
 ters, Elsie, Helen and Miriam.
 The body is expected to arrive
 in the city tonight.

**Provincial Officer
 Wanted For Forgery**

TORONTO, Jan. 6.—J. H. Gib-
 bons, one of the officers attached to
 the department of the commis-
 sioner of Ontario police at the Par-
 liament Buildings, is wanted on a
 charge of forgery. A warrant for
 his arrest has been issued and
 placed in the hands of Provincial
 Inspector Hammond. The city po-
 lice are co-operating in the hunt
 for Gibbons, who is thought to have
 fled the city after cashing a num-
 ber of pay cheques made out in
 favor of officials of the depart-
 ment.

Gibbons, according to informa-
 tion obtained by officers to the de-
 partment, left the city on the night
 of December 22, the day some of
 the cheques were cashed. The full
 three-day Christmas vacation, it is
 claimed, offered a splendid oppor-
 tunity to leave the city. When he
 did not appear at the department on
 December 26 his absence did not
 arouse suspicion, as it was thought
 he might have been detained on an
 out-of-town trip. As days passed
 inquiries were made with the re-
 sult that the alleged forgeries were
 discovered, and a warrant was is-
 sued for his arrest.

Gibbons is 28 years of age and
 married. He had been with the
 department about a year. He is a
 reserved man, having come from
 England after the war.

THROWING AWAY A FORTUNE

A fisherman, rowing along the
 Bay of Fundy, noticed what he
 took to be a very large lump of
 tallow floating on the water. He
 picked it up, took it home, and
 presented it to his wife. She was
 greatly engaged in a local indus-
 try, the making of soft soap, and
 used the "tallow" for it. The find
 however, failed to behave as tal-
 low should, and the fisherman
 was reproached by his wife for in-
 terfering and spoiling the soap. In
 a fit of disgust he threw the re-
 mainder of the supposed tallow
 away.

 known as ambergris. The man
 went home in haste, and managed
 to collect six pounds, all that re-

 ed at thirty dollars an ounce. His
 dismay can be imagined when he
 learned that, through his ignor-
 ance, he had literally thrown
 away a fortune.

**TIGER HAD A TASTE FOR CHI-
 NAMEN**

The tigers of the Malay Penin-
 sula have developed a wonderful
 liking for the Chinese laborers
 employed on public works. Per-
 haps this is due to the Chinamen's
 belief that the tigers are only big
 cats and are not to be feared. A
 British official writing in the Asia
 Magazine for June says: "At a
 certain place where a gang were
 assembled for work a manœuvre
 was taken to take a Chinaman each
 evening dark from almost the
 same spot. This continued for
 some time. Learning of it the Su-
 perintendent of Police, Captain
 Syers, our great shikari, dressed as
 a Chinaman, and nightly patrolled
 the road. Malays laughed, saying,
 "Of course the tiger knows all
 about it." They believed that the
 tiger possessed supernatural intel-
 ligence. And it certainly seemed
 that he did, for after many nights
 without sleep, the sportsman,
 who had never had the slightest
 indication of a tiger's presence,
 gave up and went home. The even-

It was announced recently that
 the Bathurst Company, Limited, a

 were sold to Royal Securities Cor-
 poration Limited. It is under-
 stood that the greater portion of
 this issue has been placed private-
 ly by Royal Securities Corporation
 with investors in Canada and the
 United States, and public offering
 of the balance is being made by an
 announcement which appears else-
 where in these columns.

The new issue of \$1,500,000 Series
 "B" bonds is the balance of a
 closed first mortgage of \$3,000,000
 and ranks equally with the issue
 of \$1,500,000 Series "A" bonds
 which was distributed in the United
 States about a year ago by
 Callaway, Fish & Company of New
 York.

Properties securing the bonds,
 including timber lands, hydro-
 electric plant and other fixed as-
 sets, have an appraised value of
 \$9,250,000 plus over \$1,000,000 to be
 spent on the newsprint mill,
 against a total of \$3,000,000 of
 bonds outstanding.

The bonds are convertible at the
 holder's option into common
 shares. The \$9,774,000 of com-
 mon stock now issued is held prin-
 cipally by directors and others
 closely connected with manage-
 ment of the company.

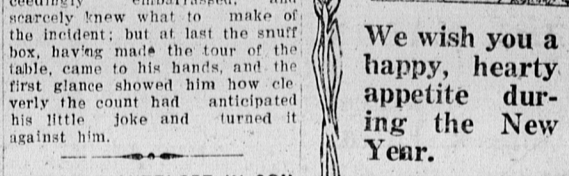
